TRANSPORT LOGAN

The transport Logan, under the command of Quartermaster-Captain Abbott, had on board eight troops of the United States Eighth Cavalry, 150 first class and 100 second class passengers and a full cargo, consisting mainly of government stores for Manila. The transport left San Francisco at noon on December 5th and experienced good weather across the Pacific.

Among those on board who leave the transport here are the following:

Lieut.-Col. J. Walker Benet, chief ordnance officer of the department of California, who is on a tour of inspection; Capt. N. F. McClure, Fifth Cavalry, joining regiment at Schofield barracks; Lieut. W. B. Graham, Twentieth Infantry, joining at Fort Shafter; Lieut. R. M. Parker, Fifth Cavalry; Lieut. L. H. Watkins, corps of engineers, returning from leave, and Lieut. Harry R. Vaughn, Coast Artillery Corps, joining battery at Fort De Russey.

The Logan brought forty-five tons of general stores for Honolulu. Immediately she was berthed at the naval wharf two large coal lighters were towed to the Ewa side and coaling operations were commenced, from the wharf as well as from the lighters.

The Logan will leave at six o'clock this evening.

TAFT FOR REFORM OF COURTS

usefulness of the Supreme Court, and especially of the Supreme Court of the United States is, in the cases which come before it, so to expound the law, and especially the fundamental law—the constitution—as to furnish precedents for the inferior courts in future litigation and for the executive officers in the construction of statutes and the performance of their legal duties. Therefore, any provisions for review of cases by the Supreme court that cast upon that court the duty of passing on questions of evidence and the construction of particular forms of instruments, like indictments, or wills, or contracts, decisions not of general application or importance, merely clog and burden the court and render more difficult its higher function, which makes it so important a part of the framework of our government. The Supreme Court is now carrying an unnecessary burden of appeals of this kind, and I earnestly urge that it be removed.

I wish to renew my urgent recommendation made in my last annual message in favor of the passage of a law which shall regulate the issuing of injunctions in equity without notice in accordance with the best practice now in vogue in the courts of the United States.

I regard this of especial importance, first because it has been promised, and second because it will deprive those who now complain of certain alleged abuses in the improper issuing of injunctions without notice of any real ground for further amendment and will take away all semblance of support for the extremely radical legislation they propose, which will be most pernicious if adopted, will sap the foundations of judicial power, and legalize that cruel social instrument, the secondary boycott.

TENDERS FOR BEEF CATTLE.

Sealed tenders, in duplicate, endorsed "TENDERS FOR BEEF CATTLE," will be received at the office of the Board of Health, until 12 o'clock, noon, Tuesday December 20th, 1910, for supplying the Leper Settlement, Molokai, with beef cattle for the period of six months from January 1st, 1911, to June 30, 1911, under the following conditions, namely:

1. The bidder must offer to furnish "at beef cattle to weigh not less than 350 lbs. net when dressed, in lots averaging about 60 head per month, more or less, as may be specified by the Superintendent of the Leper Settlement, delivered at the Leper Settlement, Molokai, and to accept the dressed weights ascertained at the Leper Settlement. For further information apply at the office of the Board of Health, Honolulu.

2. Hides, tallow and offal to be the property of the Board of Health.

3. Each bid must be for the price per pound dressed weight, with an alternative offer of the price per head.

4. The successful bidder must agree that all cattle are offered for delivery subject to the right of the Superintendent of the Leper Settlement to reject any or all unfit for use, in which event other cattle must be forthwith furnished to make up the required number and those rejected forthwith removed at the expense of the bidder.

All bids must be submitted in accordance with, and subject to, the provisions and requirements of Act 62, Session Laws 1909.

Tenders must be accompanied by certified check equal in amount to 5 per cent. of the tender on the basis of 60 head per month, or 60 head per month weighing net, when dressed, 350 pounds each.
