**REOPENING AN OLD TRUST CASE**

Yesterday the question of whether the United States should be allowed to introduce certain letters as evi-

dence in its case against Allen & Robinson et al., familiarly known as the "Lumber Trust case," was argued in the Federal Court.

The existence of the letters was learned after the United States had concluded its evidence at the last hearing. Deputy District Attorney Rawlins conducted the case for the United States, and D. L. Withington and Judge Stanley represented Lewis & Cooke and Allen & Robinson.

At the conclusion of the argument Judge Dole gave the defendants time to file a brief citing authorities, and the United States was given a further two days to answer the brief.
