HOUSE PASSES EMIGRATION BILLS AND DOES MUCH OTHER WORK

Rice's bill to define and regulate emigration agents passed third reading in the House yesterday by unanimous vote, notwithstanding a fight made by Tavares against a section, which he said recognizes contract labor in this Territory.

Castle, as chairman of the judiciary committee, gave the opinion that the Organic Act did not prohibit contract labor, but merely abolished the old Hawaiian system under which a laborer deserting contract employment was liable to imprisonment.

Rice, defending the exaction of a bond from an emigrant agent conditioned on faith being kept with laborers taken out of the country, said the provision was not unconstitutional any more than the bond required from whalers in old times that the Hawaiian sailors they shipped would be returned to the islands.

Kellinof thought something was necessary to prevent the beguiling of people out of the islands by the "honeyed words" of foreign labor recruiters.

Sheldon stood for the protection of the sugar industry as the "bone and sinew" of the country's prosperity.

Watkin's bill making it a misdemeanor to induce, entice or persuade servants or laborers to leave their employment passed second reading with amendments through adoption of a report of the judiciary committee.

With a number of amendments the House judiciary committee recommended the passage of the bill introduced by Watkins relative to legal and equitable remedies for inducing servants or laborers to leave their employment. The report was adopted.

To Stop Lotteries.

Towse's bill defining and punishing gift enterprises passed second reading with the following amendment by the health and police committee: "Provided, that nothing herein shall prohibit the use and redemption of coupons not numbered packed in articles of merchandise where originally packed, and which name the article to be given the purchaser by the seller for such coupon or coupons." The report says:

"Your committee has carefully examined into the conditions which this bill seeks to remedy and is satisfied that a number of the gift enterprises in this city are simply modified forms of lottery or gambling and it is this kind of business that this bill seeks to do away with."

On a report of the finance committee, recommending many verbal amendments, the bill to create a board of water and sewer commissioners for Honolulu passed second reading as amended.

Kona Homesteading.

The Senate bill to provide \$15,000 for the purchase of private lands in North and South Kona for homestead purposes, and to determine the price of the homesteads, passed second reading on recommendation of the finance committee.

Other Bills Advanced.

Sheldon's bill raising the salary of the Deputy Sheriff of Koloa from \$900 to \$1,200 passed second reading on a favorable report of the finance committee.

Afonso's bill to prevent the hiring out of prisoners to private employers passed second reading under a favor-

able report of the health and police committee.

A report of the public lands committee favoring the passage of the Senate bill creating a public park at Napoopoo, Hawaii, was adopted.

With a lengthy amendment the finance committee recommended the passage of the Senate bill to authorize the reduction of capital stock of corporations and joint stock companies. Adopted.

Afonso's bill relating to the duties of sheriffs and jailors passed second reading with amendments under a report of the health and police committee.

Afonso's bill forbidding deduction of a prisoner's sentence for misdemeanor on account of his refusal to perform labor was recommended for passage by the health and police committee and the report was adopted.

Archer's bill to repeal the law giving the Superintendent of Public Works charge of Honolulu buildings and removing permits passed third reading.

Divorce Reform Denied.

Towse's bill to amend the divorce law was killed on third reading, a motion by Kellinof to table it having carried, 15 to 11.

No Hilo Refund.

Afonso's bill to reimburse the subscribers to the fund for the purchase of the Severance lease required for the Federal building site in Hilo was laid on the table at the instance of the finance committee.

No Deputies Wanted.

By adoption of a report of the finance committee Manauli's bill to provide for the appointment of deputies to county and city and county offices was laid on the table.

The Punchbowl Lands.

A report of the public lands committee reaffirmed its conclusions in a former report unfavorable to the proposition of buying a surrender of the Punchbowl leasehold for \$20,000.

Simple Primary Bill.

Towse introduced a primary election bill. It aims merely at legalizing and regulating primaries having functions

similar to those heretofore exercised in this Territory, for one thing forbidding any person from voting at more than one primary.

Tavares introduced a bill to amend the law of 1909 relating to the disposition of fines, costs and bail moneys in certain cases.

FIRE CHIEF'S CAR.

Fire Chief William Burnett, of Des Moines, Iowa, driven a Chalmers car which was originally built for Hugh Chalmers. And thereby hangs an interesting tale.

A little over a year ago the City of Des Moines ordered a Chalmers car for Chief Burnett. While the car was being loaded into a freight car at the Chalmers factory some of the braces suddenly slipped. The automobile rolled from the car and turned turtle. It was damaged enough to hold up the shipment a couple of weeks while a new body was fitted.

The factory wired Chief Burnett of the accident and told him that he could not possibly have his car at the time promised. He wired back that if he could not have it on time he did not want it at all.

It happened that just at that time the Chalmers Company had completed a car of a similar type for Mr. Chalmers. This car was immediately shipped to Chief Burnett and he has been using it ever since.

"I am safe in saying," said Chief Burnett recently, "that it makes ten times the mileage of my old horse and buggy. And it is much more economical."

A WORD FOR THE TIGHTWAD.

In France they have an expressive phrase, "liquid money." It means that part of the family income which is used for the necessities and luxuries of life. It is quite apart from and kept apart from the more serious, substantial part of the income, which is the saved part. In America the entire income is "liquid," and the man who attempts to make a part of it solid is called a "tightwad." A "tightwad" is really a man who creates a principal—a capital, in other words—and he is the living example of what every private business must be and of how the country's resources should be handled. —Argonaut.
