# ROOSEVELT

now training the grandsons of the pioneers, which is engaged in training the third generation of the people of the Pacific slope.

"I am speaking as a citizen of a country which can be called young from now on only in a technical sense.

**Youth No More an Excuse.**

"I am an American of the eighth generation myself. When people have been in the land three or six or eight generations they must try no longer to advance the excuse of youth for a failure to achieve results worth achieving. (Applause.)

"In every point in which we fall short compared to the great civilizations of Europe let us hereafter abandon any attempt to excuse ourselves on the ground of youth or insufficient training and simply say that it is our fault and we will try to remedy it. (Applause.)

"I am trying to speak with a complete absence of Chauvinistic spirit when I say that in the fields of political achievement I think that in Washington and Lincoln we have produced the two loftiest types of statesmen that the world has ever seen.

"I have been rather amused to find that on the whole our people or at least those among our people who profess to be the special repositories of culture—and I am speaking more of the East now than of the West—I say that our people are actually more ignorant than Europe is of some of the deeds of our special credit.

**Ignorant of Canal.**

"For instance, the average educated person has paid astonishingly little attention until recently to the building of the Panama Canal. In Europe I found that the two feats performed by Americans in the last decade which had really made a deep impression were the digging of the Panama Canal and the sending of the battlefleet around the world.

"The Panama Canal I naturally take special interest in because I started it. (Laughter and applause.)

"There are plenty of other things I started merely because the time had come that whoever was in power would have started them.

"But the Panama Canal would not have been started if I had not taken hold of it, because if I had followed the traditional or conservative meth-

od I should have submitted an admirable state paper occupying a couple of hundred pages detailing all of the facts to Congress and asking Congress consideration of it.

"In that case there would have been a number of excellent speeches made on the subject in Congress; the debate would be proceeding at this moment with great spirit and the beginning of work on the canal would be fifty years in the future. (Laughter and applause.)

"Fortunately the crisis came at a period when I could act unhampered. Accordingly I took the isthmus, started the canal and then left Congress not to debate the canal, but to debate me. (Laughter and applause.)

"In portions of the public press the debate still goes on as to whether or not I acted properly in taking the canal.

"But while the debate goes on the canal does too, and they are welcome to debate me as long as they wish, provided that we can go on with the canal. (Applause.)

"Now I believe that I am saying the exact truth, that I am speaking with scientific accuracy, when I say that by all odds the canal is the greatest feat of the kind that has ever been attempted by civilized mankind, and that our engineers and doctors have done their work there better than any corresponding men of any country have ever done any work before. (Applause.)

**Want First-Rate Men.**

"I wish to see us produce in this country what we do not produce except in exceptional cases—men who in science, in art, in literature, will stand abreast of the best men in any other country.

"And remember this: When I speak of that species of achievement I speak of the kind of achievement in which nothing counts except first-rate work. A thousand good things second and third rate in literature do not make up in any shape or in any way for the lack of any one great master in literature."

**SPRECKELS CASE RULING.**

Victory in one phase of the inter-family feud between the four sons of the late Claus Spreckels, rested with Rudolph and Gus Speckels yesterday through a decision of Judge Murakay. The court overruled the demurrers interposed by the Oceanic Steamship Company and the Union Trust Company in the suit brought by Rudolph Spreckels to have the Union Trust

Company removed as trustee for the steamship line.

The date for trial will be set in the near future.

One of the charges brought against the Union Trust Company is that it conspired with the John D. Spreckels & Sons Company to cause a depreciation in the value of the bonds of the Oceanic Steamship Company in order that the John D. Spreckels & Co., might buy the bonds at a reduced figure.

Collusion with the Oceanic Company was charged, also mismanagement. It was claimed that the interests of the body of stockholders had been neglected by the trust company.

In answer to these charges the trust company replied that the bondholders whom Rudolph Spreckels announced himself to represent had no standing in the suit because the Oceanic Steamship Company is the only one empowered to discharge or appoint its trustee.

**ODD FRENCH ENGLISH.**

A correspondent has been studying English pronunciation in a French dictionary (Pierre Larousse, 1890) and picks out a few examples to show how much effort is necessary for a Frenchman to acquire a true articulation of English. They are all taken from a surprisingly long list of English phrases current in France. "Broken down (as applied to a race horse) is 'bro-k'n-daoun.' 'Dead heat' is rendered as 'did-hith,' which is ingenious, but hardly correct. 'At-half' is not a bad attempt for 'high life,' although the aspirate is missing. 'Self government' looks an even more imposing political ideal as 'self gheuv-ernment,' and the word 'shocking' is quite applicable when rendered 'chok-inn-que.' The opening words of Hamlet's famous soliloquy have a decidedly foreign look. 'To be or not to be, that is th' kooess-tcheunn.'"—Manchester Guardian.
