AT THE THEATERS

Popular Theater Reopens.

Honolulu theater-goers will welcome the news that the Park theater, which has been dark for some time, will open its doors again tonight.

The management has secured for this opening an act that is known the world over—Miss Schell and her trained lions.

Miss Schell was for a long time a trainer for Hagenbeck the famous wild animal trapper and trainer of Hamburg, Germany. There she was thoroughly grounded in the principles which have brought Hagenbeck his fame, and on leaving his services was presented with a pair of lion cubs captured in the wilds of Africa.

These little savages, no larger than puppies, she took with her to her ranch in San Jose, California, where during her more peaceful pursuit of the prize crop she raised them to maturity and gave them their education.

These animals are now the largest black maned African lions in captivity. Their extreme docility can be only ascribed to the salubrious climate of Santa Clara County and the fact that their trainer and mistress had them in hand from their infancy.

She handles them as a child would play with a kitten, and rides and otherwise takes liberties with them that others would hesitate to take with anything less savage than a hobby horse.

bearer carrying the colors aloft while standing upon the hips of two soldiers. Another does the muscle-grinder on a horizontal bar held between two horses both going at full gallop. Princess Susanna, the midget tight-wire walker, and Whittier and Cronson, the vocalists, are also on the program.

NEW PLAN AS TO GOAL LANDS

(Special Correspondence of THE STAR.) WASHINGTON, March 23.—A radical departure in the manner of disposing of government coal lands in the West has just been announced, indicating that all future sales of public coal lands will be based on a per ton price instead of \$10 or \$20 per acre. The geological survey, it is learned, has been actively preparing for the change by making extensive borings in Western coal fields in order to determine the gross tons contained in given areas—on which information will depend the prices to be paid in future. The new plan of selling Western coal lands on the per ton basis will increase the price from \$200 to \$600 per acre.

The method of survey is tedious and expensive, consisting of diamond drill borings to show the thickness of the veins, their dip and area. The discoveries thus far indicate a varying thickness of from twelve to twenty feet. One deposit in Montana just completed shows the presence of 2,500,000 tons of coal, and the purchaser must pay a per ton price on this basis.

There is now a total of 13,480,000 acres classed as coal lands withdrawn from entry. On the basis of the old price these would have netted the government \$218,239,942. The value under the new per ton scheme is \$637,618,418—an increased cost to the coal operators of the future of \$420,000,000. Just how this increased cost can be met without the additional burden being placed upon the consumer is not made plain. The effect of such a plan, in the opinion of many Western members, would be to either prevent the opening of new mines or else considerably increase the cost of coal to the consumer. In either event, present coal operators would greatly profit.
