Oh, humorous and incredible as it appears he still exists, lives, breathes and has his being not alone on the patronage of the bourgeoisie!

Because any morning between nine and twelve aristocratic touring cars can be seen drawn up in front of these Nuuanu street pigeon-holes, while ladies unabashed at the indignity of their positions submit to fittings by "the man at the tailor shop."

Occasionally an elaborately described creation in the society columns was sent to these dens in its primitive state of satin in bulk and rare laces, and came forth in a mildly suggestively smelly condition which was soon obliterated by violet sachet, and was compensated by the comforting knowledge that nobody even suspected!


