TOUR PLANNED BY CHINESE TEAM

The proposition to send a team of Chinese ball players to the mainland next year is an idea which Sam Hop and K. C. Yap have been working on for some little time past, but matters are still in a tentative stage. Nothing has been decided, nor will a decision be arrived at for some little time. The Chinese team has not yet been organized, but the organizers are working along this line now and will no doubt be able to get all the best of the Chinese players together.

The team will not be composed solely of local players, though every member of the team will be an Hawaiian-born Chinese, but there are three or four players on the mainland who would join the team on its arrival here. It is proposed to leave here in April of next year, play a few games on the Pacific coast and then cross the continent to the Eastern states, playing games en route. The greater part of the time will be spent in the Eastern states, and if the team meets with a moderate measure of success it is probable that the tour will be lengthened to take in the Southern states and even Cuba. But all this is more or less moonshine. The lads are only talking the matter over, and until something definite is done in the way of floating a corporation to finance the undertaking it is somewhat premature to speak of possibilities.

The first series the Chinese will play, as already intimated by The Star, is a series with Kelo if this can be arranged, and on the showing the Chinese make in that series much will depend. It is realized by the Chinese themselves that to be successful the team must be able to put up ball of a good standard, ball which will reflect credit on Hawaii, and ensure good attendances, and to do this it is essential that the Chinese themselves sink class prejudices and pull together. There can be no internal dissension if such a tour is to be a success. This feature cannot be too strongly impressed on the players, for to it is due the downfall of the C. A. C.

The Chinese will have a strong line up against Kelo if present arrangements hold good. Every effort will be made to get the services of Sing Chong, who is now in Harvard, for the series. Sing Chong will be on vacation for a couple of months from the 12th inst., and he has been invited to proceed post haste to Honolulu, to arrive here by the Persia which will bring the Kelo boys across. Then W. Ayau, who is now on Maui, will be brought up for the series to play at third. If plans hold good the Chinese will have the following line up:

Chai Pul, c.; Apau, p.; Akana, 1st; Asam, 2d; Ayau, ss.; Sing Chong, 3d; En Sue, cf.; Ah Tin, rf., and Hang Chack, lf.
