NEW WIRELESS ACT DOESN'T APPLY TO INTER-ISLAND STEAMERS

By a cabled announcement already published in the Star, it will be seen that the Washington authorities have set the price of disobedience to the new act calling for the installation of wireless telegraphy on certain vessels at \$5000. The new act comes into force on July 1. Under it all vessels—domestic or foreign—carrying fifty persons or more out of an American port a distance of over two hundred

miles, must carry a wireless telegraph instrument, and be capable of sending messages one hundred miles. The form of examination for those who would seek positions in this field also has been published in the Star. So far, no local applicants have appeared for examination. The vessels of the American-Hawaiian or that Inter-Island S. S. Company are not brought within the provisions of the new act.

KOREA MISHAP WAS EXAGGERATED

The Korea arrived this morning off port within a few minutes of the time stated by Captain Saunders in his last wireless message to the agents, namely, half-past six.

The Korea brought 18 cabin passengers to Honolulu, including layovers, while in the second-class there were 10, with 90 in the steerage, comprising one Russian, 27 Filipinos, 20 Chinese and 32 Japanese. She also has a big through passenger list. The through cargo is a valuable one, and included \$95,000 worth of raw silk and silk goods, with 10,000 bags of copra, 25,000 boxes of green tea, 800 bags of green coconuts, 1900 bales of hemp, 2800 bags of linseed and 1000 bags of rice. For Honolulu there are 750 tons of general merchandise, wines and spirits, beans, tea, cigars, and 63 bags of mail.

The story of the accident to the Korea seems to have been exaggerated, for it was stated on board that she was only about a half a mile off her proper course. This was due to the "smokiness" of the atmosphere. She was near the head of the harbor, and there was no danger at any time. She remained on the ground for about six hours, and during that time she was never in a serious position. The passengers went ashore in order that they might do their shopping and sight-seeing. There was no delay at all, for this was her arriving day, and she will sail at half-past five this afternoon for San Francisco. There was never any necessity to land the passengers, say the officers.

Purser Allen stated that the trip over was an excellent one. On Thursday evening a masquerade dinner was held, and it was a wonderful success. The costumes, he said, were excellent, and it was little short of marvelous to see the productions from the limited stock available on board. Master Curtis, as a Chinese singing girl, was a great success.

On the outward voyage the passengers had a little interesting excitement for the marriage of Miss Henrietta Ritchie to Robert E. Burris was celebrated at the United States consulate, Yokohama. This is said to have been a runaway match, and, of course, that heightened the interest. The lady member of the combine went over on the Korea, and she made all the arrangements. Elaborate invitation cards were prepared, and the ceremony was carried out without a hitch.

Makura Due Monday Morning.

Once more the Makura is going to revolutionize the running of the Canadian-Australian boats by getting here a full day ahead of time. On her last trip she arrived a day and a half in advance of her schedule date. This time she will be in on Monday morning at about nine o'clock. The usual time is Tuesday morning, or rather
