there the crop should be nearly double those of the past. The mills are running for a much longer season in order to handle the cane and the crop is a very fine one. The weather while I was there was rainy and unpleasant, but the Kona people are too much pleased over the prospects to bother about a little rain.

The vacancy made as wharfinger at Punaluu landing, through the appointment of Robert Forrest as tax assessor for Hawaii, will be filled by the transfer of Alfred Patten from Honsapo, where he holds a similar position.

Horses for Kahului.

HILO, June 19.—The O'Rourke-Brughell string of horses which will take in the Maui races is now in fine condition and will leave for Kahului a week from today. The following animals will go down: Spring Ban, St. Avon, Delingo, Major Collier and Hilo Boy. The last named is a pacer and all the others are running horses. It is expected that the Hilo horses will make a better showing than they did last year, and it is certain that Hilo Boy will put up a better race against Hauli Boy than Harry Hurst did. The little pacer has a fine burst of speed, which he showed out well in the Kamehameha Day races, and will be backed to win by the local people who go down. Major Collier

is in fine fettle and should make his usual good showing, though in the preliminary training he has not shown the speed which Delingo has. The fact that he can stand plenty of hard work should give him a good chance at the end of the program. St. Avon is also in good condition and Spring Ban, a chestnut mare brought down from the Coast by Louis Morrell, is expected to make the other horses hurry along.

Dr. L. W. O'Rourke, from Nevada, a son of John O'Rourke, will have charge of the horses and has looked after the workouts here. He may drive Hilo Boy in the harness race, or possibly Louis Morrell will handle the lines. It is understood that C. E. Wright, of this city, has been asked to be one of the judges. The position was offered to W. H. C. Campbell, of this island, who is a Maui kamaaina, but who was compelled to refuse, as he could not leave his business.
