TRAVELERS FORGOT CORONATION

The Nippon Maru arrived off port shortly after six o'clock last night, but she was not granted pratique until early this morning, arriving at the wharf at about half-past eight. Notwithstanding the fact that Japan is an ally of Great Britain, and there are several Britons holding positions on board, no attempt was made yesterday to observe Coronation Day on board. The saloon was not decorated in any way, and there was not even a special dinner. The purser remarked this morning that he thought the day was quite forgotten by everyone on board; he cordially admitted that he had overlooked it. This too, in face of the fact that he has pictures of his late majesty, King Edward the Peacemaker, the present king, George V. and Earl Roberts, as well as other silken emblems of "Rule Britannia." The trip over was an uncomfortable one. For six days after leaving Yokohama the weather was extremely unpleasant. After that, however, conditions modified and the trip was more enjoyable. The vessel had only 4,000 tons of cargo for this port. This comprises general merchandise. She had seven cabin passengers, one second-class and seventy-eight in the steerage, principally Japanese women. There were four Filipinos. The majority of the Japanese women have come over here to get married, and the scene on board this morning was entertaining when the women met their prospective husbands. Both stood bowing and scraping before each other, the lady looking extremely modest but happy. The Nippon Maru has a fairly large through cargo, but her through passenger list is not great—thirty-eight cabin, thirteen second-class and forty-one Asiatics. The Nippon Maru leaves at three o'clock this afternoon in continuation of her voyage to the Coast. Marama at Four O'Clock. According to wireless advices received by the agents for the Canadian-Australian Steamship Co., Theo. Davies & Co., the Marama will arrive at four o'clock this afternoon from Vancouver. She will sail again at midnight for Sydney, via Brisbane and Fiji. The Nippon Maru's Fate. Exactly what will happen to the Nippon Maru after this trip is not known to anybody outside the officials of the company. Purser Grasset, when seen on board this morning, said that he was in the dark as to what would happen to her. Perhaps he would be given a month's rest, and then put on her again. This remark was prompted by his belief that the Nippon will be given a complete overhaul at Kobe, and then be placed in the service again. Perhaps it would take two months to clean her thoroughly. He couldn't say anything definite on this point, but he firmly believed that she would be seen on this run again. Who was to take the position of purser on the Shinyo Maru was another point on which he had to profess ignorance. He believed that it lay between him and Cavalry of the America Maru, but Cavalry was his senior by two years service. Speaking of himself, he would just as soon be on one of the small boats; there was nothing to induce one to seek a berth on the Nippon Maru.

The Mauna Loa arrived early this morning from Kona and Kau ports and judging by her manifest those on board must have thought that they were on floating menagerie, for she had two boxes of turkeys, twenty-seven boxes of chickens, seven boxes of pigs, six pigs, six cows, sixteen calves, twenty-eight bundles of fruits, thirty-four bags of beans, eighty-nine bunches of bananas, 101 boxes of fruits, thirty head of cattle, 532 bags of coffee, 7,200 bags of sugar and 193 packages of sundries. Sugar Awaiting Shipment. The following sugar was awaiting shipment on Hawaii, according to Purser Sheldon of the Mauna Loa: At Punaluu 10,414 bags, Hanalei 464, Kailua 2,500, Kukuhae 24,000, Honolea 14,000, Paailo 9,900, Kukaui 5,462.
