### LAST CALL FOR STALL KEEPERS

The Board of Health has issued an ultimatum to the stall keepers at the fish market, to the effect that unless their places are screened in manner satisfactory to the Board by next Friday night, they will be refused the privilege of doing business the following day or in the future until the work is done.

Since the first of July these dealers have been doing business without a license, under an arrangement made between the Health Department and the county treasurer's office, in order to give them time to comply with the screening regulations. Some of the stall-keepers "bucked the game" at the start, but then when the Board stood pat and called them, they threw down their hands and came across with very good grace. The few who are still holding out, will doubtless comply with requirements, rather than have their business closed, as they will be, if the board's orders are not carried out by Friday night.

Under the present laws, the County may not license any kind of an establishment without a health permit having been first obtained from the Board of Health. More than this the law gives the Board the power to revoke such permits, and thus suspend the licenses affected, at any time that unsanitary conditions may make such order seem advisable.

### BIG TREES IN KILAUEA PARK

HILO, July 30.—That work of the highest importance is being done by Territorial Botanist J. F. Rock, who came up from Honolulu recently and is now staying near the Volcano House, is shown by the fact that in the Puuau tract alone, which is but two hundred acres in extent, he has discovered five species of trees which have never before been described by a botanist. Some of these trees are absolutely unique, while others are closely allied to trees found in Kona or on Kauai, but differ in important essentials.

Two specimens of new species of the Kaawau Kuakapa were found in this lot, the Kaawau Kuakapa being the tree which the natives of Kauai used many years ago for the pounding of the tapa. The species found

### LINDLEY BOYS AT THE VOLCANO

HILO, July 30.—The two Lindley boys, of Honolulu, now have a pet which should be a good souvenir of the Kilauea volcano, in the shape of a tiny goat which they captured between the volcano and the coast on a trip which caused considerable anxiety to the other members of their family. When they were here two weeks ago they decided that it only appeared to be a few miles from the Volcano House to the ocean, and it only does look like a short distance, when the weather is clear, so off they started for a swim.

They kept traveling on and found the distance stretching out ahead of them, but refused to give up and still kept on, finally reaching their destination and indulging in a sea bath which they certainly enjoyed after the long, hard walk. Their clothes were torn and their shoes were but tatters. Then came the trip back, which was

by Mr. Rock, however, differ from any which have yet been found. They are eighty feet in height and have fine straight trunks.

A number of specimens of the ac tree, which was recently discovered by Mr. Rock in Hualai, North Kona, have also been located by him at Kipukaki, which is about a mile from Puuau and about three miles from Ollie Shipman's ranch house. The ac trees at Kipukaki are much finer than those in Kona and some are over a hundred feet in height and at least five feet through.

In the Puuau section are some magnificent koa trees, which four men were unable to join hands around, and it is interesting to note that both Puuau and Kipukaki are within the boundaries of the proposed national park, which it is hoped will be purchased by Congress.

WASHINGTON, August 2.—The special house committee which is investigating the methods of the alleged sugar trust returned from New York and had a hearing yesterday at which Secretary Palmer of the United States Beet Sugar Company gave some interesting testimony.

Mr. Palmer was led up to the question of what effect the tariff had on the operations of the so-called trust and replied that within fifteen years this country could produce all the sugar it needs if the tariff remains undisturbed.

In the house the La Follette compromise on the wool schedule was received and the Democrats in the house promptly turned it down, refusing to concur, although passed in the senate with Democratic votes.

Conference committees have been appointed by both houses in an effort to arrive at some satisfactory compromise of the compromise.

ST. PETERSBURG, Russia, August 2.—Madame Morozoff, owner of the largest cotton mills in Russia and reputed to be the richest woman in the country, died here yesterday. Her fortune is reported at forty million dollars.

JACKSON, Mississippi, August 2.—The returns so far received from the primary elections indicate that former Governor Vardaman has been selected as the next United States senator from this State.

MEXICO CITY, August 2.—Bernardo Reyes, who was slated as the secretary of war under Madero, has informally announced his candidacy for president of Mexico, in rivalry to General Francisco Madero.

PORT AU PRINCE, Hayti, August 2.—The capital is entirely surrounded by the troops of the revolutionists.

HAVANA, Cuba, August 2.—The alleged revolution which General Acevedo has started in Cuba is reported to have been financed in the United States, but it is stated to be of no importance and is purely local.

Both rurales and regular troops are out searching for Acevedo and his followers, but so far it is reported without success.

AUBURNDALE, Massachusetts, August 2.—Bishop Willard Francis Mal-lieu, of the Methodist church, died here yesterday in his eighty-third year.

EL ORO, Mexico, August 2.—A general strike is now in progress in this district and 10,000 men have quit work, including the 3000 miners with whom the troops clashed on Monday.

Rewards have been offered for the arrest and conviction of the assassins of the English experts who were employed in the mines near here.

MASSENANY, Canada, August 2.—Seven persons were drowned in the St. Lawrence river here yesterday when a ferry boat struck a shoal and upset.
