

OAHU MEETS KAUI AT POLO TODAY

The first game of the polo tournament will be played at Moanalua this afternoon between the Oahu and Kauai teams.

The tournament has an interesting look although the conclusion looks to be a foregone one and the Kauai quarter should experience no great difficulty in retaining their laurels.

The Oahu players may be relied on to make a good fight. Walter Dillingham and Harold Castle will probably do the lion's share of the work though Atkinson may have come on with

practise since the last game with the cavalry, and if Harold Dillingham is feeling fit he may be relied on to give a display of his old-time form.

WILL PUT HAWAII IN THE A. A. U. OFFICIAL RECORDS

Lorrin Andrews, high chief of the A. A. U., has just discovered that there will be another little job on his hands after getting clear of today's swimming carnival.

This is nothing less than the pulling off of a full-fledged open athletic meet under the auspices of the Amateur Athletic Union before the end of September.

The rules of the union call for such a meet being held, and failure in this respect would entail loss of franchise. Every A. A. U. association must bring off an open track meet every year and forward the records made thereat to the parent body in New York.

Speaking of the matter this morning, Lorrin Andrews said:

"Just as soon as my hands are clear of the swimming meet I shall take up the matter of the open track meet which we are compelled to hold. There won't be a great deal of time, but I expect that everything will come through satisfactorily.

"The idea is to get a delegation from Hawaii, Maui and Kauai to compete in the game, and this will be done if the question of traveling expenses can be adjusted. I don't think that there will be any difficulty in getting the necessary money put up by public-spirited, sport-loving individuals on the islands named. Once the athletes are here they can be taken care of and looked after by the A. A. U.

"The meet will probably be brought off at Alexander Field, which was kindly promised to us for the proposed Fourth of July meet by President Griffiths. That meet was dropped off when it was found that the Kauai Athletic Association had arranged a meet for the same day. The Maui people were all at the races, and that was another reason for the postponement of the event. I don't believe that there will be any difficulty in securing the use of the field for the coming meet. It will be the most important affair of its kind ever held in Hawaii, and will, I believe, create a great deal of interest."

The list of events at the meeting will be as follows:

- 100, 220, 440, 880, mile and five-mile runs. 120 yards high hurdles. 220 yards low hurdles. Pole vault. Running high jump. Running long jump. Running hop, step and jump. Putting 16-pound shot. Throwing 16-pound hammer. Throwing 55-pound weight. Throwing the discus. Throwing the javelin.

The last new events are new to Hawaii, and Lorrin Andrews will take immediate steps to secure the necessary apparatus.
