HEINRICH RENJES DIES IN GERMANY

Heinrich Renjes, formerly a partner in the firm of F. A. Schaefer & Co., before its incorporation, died at Wiesbaden, Germany, yesterday, aged fifty-six years. The cause of death was apoplexy.

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APPROVE PLANS OF CAMPBELL

A drowning tragedy occurred on Saturday at Waikiki between the Moana Hotel and the Waikiki Inn.

A number of men from the U. S. S. Princeton were bathing off the beach when J. J. Mahon was heard calling for help. A. J. Dando and J. H. Flynn started to his rescue.

Mahon was eventually rescued by Quartermaster O. Neidlinger, who pulled the exhausted man into shallow water.

G. M. Schreppe, who also replied to Mahon's cries for help, got into difficulties in the same hole as his companions did and was brought out of deep water by G. R. Wilson, chief electrician aboard the transport Sheridan.

When Schreppe was brought to the beach every effort was made to restore respiration but without effect.

There have been a number of accidents in the hole in the lagoon in question.

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
