A NEW SCHEME FOR FISHERMEN

A new fishing wrinkle has just been evolved by a local sportsman and will be put into execution in a short time.

It is a well-known fact that when the schools of flying-fish come to these shores they are followed by great predatory fish which prey on the flyers and work havoc in their finny ranks.

These fish are mostly of the mackerel tribe and sometimes they are seen to leap clear of the water in their pursuit of the elusive flying-fish and catch them literally "on the wing."

The gentleman in question has fished for these great mackerel from a launch, baiting his hook with a flying-fish, but this impaled, sea-going prisoner is not as frisky as the untrammelled and free rover of the billows and does not appeal to the big fellows like the wave-skimmers.

The fisherman responsible for the new idea intends, on arriving at the fishing ground, to send a large kite aloft. To the kite string, a short distance from the kite, will be affixed a

pendant light line with a ring. Attached through the ring the angler's tackle will be run. The boatman works the kite in such a way that the pendant flying-fish baited line will jump and skip over the water in the most natural manner. This trick is the milk in the coconut.

The maneuvers are carried on in water where the big fish have been located. It is expected that these fish will soon discover the juggling of the dangling flying-fish and attend to business.

The new ruse has been tried in Californian waters with success and there seems to be no reason why it shouldn't work here.

One drawback to the suspension lure business is lack of a breeze. The local experimenter expects to offset this, however, by taking a small balloon with him which will keep his tackle in an offensive position, wind or no wind.

OLD ENGLISH-CHANNEL RECORD STANDS

The news that William Burgess, a Yorkshireman, had succeeded in swimming the English Channel was received with much interest by the local swimming fraternity.

To swim the channel has long been a feat which the best swimmers of the world have tried to accomplish, the most persistent having been Jabez Wolfe, who has made over a score of attempts.

Captain Matthew Webb swam from Dover to Calais on August 24 and 25,

1875. His time was 21 hours 45 minutes. This daring swimmer afterward lost his life while trying to swim the rapids of Niagara.

Burgess, who is believed to have swam from Calais to Dover, performed the feat in 22 hours 35 minutes.

Beside Wolfe, Horace Mew, T. Burgess and Miss A. Kellerman of Australia and M. Holbein, have all tried the trip and failed. Wolfe once got within three and one-half miles of the French coast.

ROWING CREWS AND THE A. A. U.

The Hui Nalu canoe crew which will contest for the championship on Regatta Day will be made up as follows:

The Outrigger Club will enter a crew in the six-paddle championship race. The Kona paddlers will not pay Honolulu a visit this year and it is reported that the Kamehameha

Aquatic Club of Kalihi will not compete. If this report is true, it is a great pity, for the Kalihi boys are splendid paddlers and would make the best of the other crews hustle for first honors.

While cash prizes are advertised for the canoe races, Secretary Rietow said this morning that trophies would be given the winners if such were desired. The A. A. U. has no jurisdiction over canoe racing, but it would hardly look right for men who have registered with the A. A. U. to compete for money prizes even in a branch of sport over which the A. A. U. takes no cognizance.

SAYS BASEBALL NEEDS NEW DEAL

A local baseball magnate, discussing the baseball situation this morning said:

"We are waiting patiently for the close of the Oahu Baseball League's season—patiently and painfully waiting for the end. It's like watching for the death of a man suffering from cancer of the stomach for it's agony long-drawn out.

"The boys are playing first-chop ball and it's a shame that they have to suffer for the management of the athletic park. I believe that after last Sunday's games each player received seventeen cents as his share of the proceeds. Not very encouraging, is it?"

"Tommy Treadway, manager of the athletic park, has done the best he knew how to run the place right but the trouble is that he didn't know enough to make a success of it. He

has been tactless and undiplomatic. The Japanese boycott is directed against him and not against the Oahu Baseball League.

"If he will resign as manager of the park or fix up his differences with the Japanese press and the Japanese fans, all may yet be well and the league season end in a blaze of glory similar to that in which it started. If he remains obstinate, however, the second series of the Oahu League will fizzle out miserably and the game will have been done great damage.

"The league has \$400 worth of stock in the athletic park enterprise and the management hold the rest.

"If the present dog-in-the-manger, rule or ruin policy of the management be adhered to it will be up to somebody to form a new league and to find new grounds on which to play the league games."
