DUKE KAHANAMOKU FUND GOT SUBSTANTIAL BOOST YESTERDAY

The benefit for the Duke Kahanamoku fund, got up by Charles Barron and carried out at the Athletic Park yesterday afternoon, was a success both from a sporting and financial viewpoint, \$224.25 being turned over to the fund as the result of the day's work.

About eight hundred people were present and some excellent sport was witnessed.

The feature of the afternoon was the breaking of the five-mile record by Soldier King in the relay race. The mark set by Jimmy Fitzgerald was 27:40 2-5. King's time yesterday was 27:39 4-5. His opponents in the race were Jim Hoao, Sallor Blumenthal and Sallor Woodward.

Farren's time in the 880-yard event, 2:08 1-2, was within half a second of the long-standing local record to the credit of Deverill.

It is to be hoped that Farren will compete in the half mile to be run on February 17 at the Boys' Field in connection with the Chinese New Year celebration. If he should it looks as if he would break the record for sure.

Dora D. is the bay mare which defeated Kaliki Boy in a couple of straight races at Kapiolani, to the deep disappointment of a certain coterie of sure thing backers.

Frankie is an aged chestnut which has been beating all comers down Ewa way and which is believed to have a very good chance of taking the measure of the shifty mare.

Rollins will train the mare at Honolulu. The race will be held in the morning of the 22nd in order to allow the country people to come up to town in time for the parade in the afternoon.

ROAD RUNNING NOW FAVORED

Two road races have been arranged between the students of Kamehameha Schools and Oahu College.

The first will take place on January 29 over a course from the Aquarium to the High School.

The second race will occur on February 7 and will be from Kamehameha Schools to Fort Shafter and return.

There will be twelve men on each team and the men will be pointed in the order in which they finish, the team securing the smallest aggregate of points being declared the winner.

A time limit of thirty minutes will be named and in the unlikely event of any runner exceeding this time he will be scored twenty-four points.

It is probable that the High School may accept an invitation to take part in the races though it is doubtful if they can enter a full team of twelve men.

The Kamehameha boys held the second of their preliminary runs last Friday afternoon. The order at the finish was J. Jones, J. Amos, P. Wright. The two and a half miles from the school to Fort Shafter and return was covered in sixteen minutes.

The third run of the series will be held this week and this will be followed by a final race for the championship of the school in which the first and second men in the three preliminary races, will compete.

The first and second men in the first run were H. Wright and W. Apau. These men were barred from taking part in Friday's run. They, together with J. Jones and J. Amos, will not be allowed to run in this week's trial, but all four will race against the first and second men home in the third race, in the contest for the championship.
