Tommy Burns' opinion of the Langford-McVey fight in Sydney was expressed as follows:

"With the exception of a few rounds, and in one of these McVey only shaded Langford, the latter won all the way, and by a big surplus. He blocked McVey's long lefts beautifully time after time, and jabbed and hooked him where I thought McVey would be clever enough to stop any liberties.

I must admit Langford is a fighter, and a boxer, too; he did wonders. It was calling to me to see him deprived of what was so deservedly his, consequently I can guess what his feelings were, though he said that it was no use kicking, and is content to hide his time and repeat the dose on another occasion with a different referee.

I always gave Snowy Baker credit for knowing the game thoroughly, and always said there was no better referee, but I have changed my mind a good deal. I had the same thing handed out to me many a time when I was fighting, and could do nothing but grin and bear it."

ENGLISH CRICKETERS WIN THIRD TEST MATCH WITH AUSTRALIANS

ADELAIDE, January 17--The third test match was concluded today, the Englishmen winning with seven wickets to spare.

On the conclusion of play yesterday the Australians had lost five wickets for 360 runs.

Minnett and Hordern, the two not-out men from the previous day, continued their innings.

Minnett was caught by Hobbs off Barnes without increasing his score, and Hordern fell, a victim to Barnes after adding a couple.

Ransford and Matthews then got together and put on 91 runs between them. Matthews especially played splendidly. Trumper, who was injured in the first innings and is lame, was the last man in and scored a single, not out.

Barnes was most successful with the ball, securing five wickets for 104.

With 112 runs to get to win, England commenced their second innings, and had lost one wicket for twenty runs at the afternoon tea adjournment.

On resuming Gunn and Rhodes got together, and playing with great confidence put up 102 by sound cricket.

The requisite number of runs were secured for the loss of three wickets, Rhodes carrying out his bat for fifty-seven.

In England's first innings Hobbs made 187, Porter 71, Rhodes 59, Mead 46, Douglas 35, Gunn 29, Smith 20.

England has won two out of the three best matches played. The series is the best three in five.

H. L. HERBERT ON SYDNEY FISHING

H. L. Herbert, the well known cricketer, fisherman and sportsman generally, who after a long residence in Honolulu, returned with his family to his home in Australia a few years ago, writes to the sporting editor of the Hawaiian Star that he is well and doing well, also that his family are well.

"I have had some fine fishing out here," he writes, "especially blackfish and flathead, and off the rock at Bondi. I have caught a lot of my old friends of the Hawaiian waters, but here the colors are not so brilliant and the names are of course vastly different; for instance, they call the

poopaa the rock-perch here.

"The rivers a little way back from the Coast are heavily stocked with trout and it is not unusual to catch a five-pound fish. In fact, I have seen them stuffed up to ten pounds, and apparently they are the English speckled species.

"I have had some fine rabbit shooting also. In some places, though, it's a waste of powder and shot to shoot them. You can knock them over with a stick, and that's no traveler's yarn. "Sydney people are madder than ever on surfing. Of course, it's all body-surfing here, and I can't enthuse a little bit over it. It looks so tame to me after Waiaki."

STALLING OF CRAFTY ABE

NEW YORK, January 20--The State Athletic Commission will institute an inquiry next Wednesday as to the honesty of the Abe Attell-Knockout Brown boxing contest January 18.

Although Brown was badly battered by the featherweight champion, many attendants protested that Attell was not doing his best and permitted his heavier opponent to land many blows he could have avoided.

Local sporting writers will be called as experts on the genuineness of the contest.

In this connection "Dumb" Dan Morgan, manager of K. O. Brown, doubtless with an eye to a prospective match with Hogan or some other lightweight in San Francisco, has sent out a most remarkable statement. Morgan has taken into himself the privilege of interviewing Abe Attell, making the featherweight champion give his usual excuses and in the same breath having Abe admit that K. O. bested him. Read it, but bear in mind all the time that Morgan wrote it.

NEW YORK, January 21--Abe Attell, featherweight champion of the world, said today that his bout with "Knockout" Broys at the National Sporting Club on Thursday last was strictly on the level.

"I did the best I could. I was outweighed and out-punched by a younger and stronger boy. I had all my generalship into play to try and change the verdict, but he would not fall for it, but kept tearing in all the time.

"A left-hand stomach punch in the fourth round took all the fight out of me, and the only thing that kept me together was my ring experience, which has brought me through many a hard battle. Brown is the toughest lightweight in the world today. I thought I could outbox him and get away with the decision. I was surprised when he not only outboxed me but outboxed me in different styles. He has improved wonderfully in his boxing and fighting ability and looks like the best man in his class in the country today."

Frankie Burns was a 10 to 7 favorite over Jack Britton.
