Jockey Willis is acting as trainer for de Mello. He has been doing a good deal of boxing of late and expresses a desire to meet any local man at 116 pounds.

De Mello will be provided with good sparring partners on his arrival and this will get him on edge for his engagement. He is in fine shape now and needs fast work more than anything.

In writing he stated that he didn't want to be in town more than a week before his contest lest he mightn't be able to get into that tip-top condition in which he aims to be on the night of the go.

Hoao is working steadily with his sparring partners at the Kamehameha Alumni headquarters which is equipped with a fine gymnasium. His hundreds of friends and admirers all over the island are taking a great interest in his meeting with the Portuguese champion and if he fails to lower the latter's colors they will be grievously disappointed.

QUEKEMEYER TO THE GAMES

WASHINGTON, January 26.—Preparations are already being made by the United States Army for participation in the Olympic games at Stockholm, Sweden, next July. Five officers have been assigned to prepare for the trip, though the Army team probably will be composed of only four. Those selected are Captain Guy V. Henry, cavalry; First Lieutenant Ben Lear Jr., Third Cavalry; John C. Montgomery, Seventh Cavalry; E. F. Graham, Fifteenth Cavalry, and Second Lieutenant Quekemeyer, Fifth Cavalry. Captain Henry and Lieutenant Graham were on the team which represented the Army at the Horse Show in London.

Four of these officers are at present at the Army mounted service school at Fort Riley, and Lieutenant Quekemeyer has been ordered to that post from Honolulu.

MAY NOW EXAMINE MONKEY'S INTERNALS

PORTLAND, Ore., January 22.—An order was granted by United States Judge Wolvorton today giving the Northern Pacific Railway Company opportunity to examine the internal organs of the late monkey Charles I, which died in a Northern Pacific baggage car between Seattle and Portland a year ago. Charles Judge, the owner of the monkey, is suing the Northern Pacific to collect \$200,000 damages for its death.

When Charles I died his vital organs were preserved in alcohol to prove the claim that he had died of pneumonia as a result of having caught cold en route. The railroad attorneys have been seeking permission to examine the viscera for some time.

Charles I was appearing over the Orpheum circuit at the time of his death.

NEW YORK, January 12.—Word comes from Havana that Jose R. Capablanca, the Cuban chess champion, who is resting after his South American and European tours, has decided to prolong his stay until the end of February. He will then prepare for his next tour of the United States, which he will open at New Orleans. Incidentally Capablanca is waiting for the next move from Dr. Emanuel Lasker in the negotiations for the world's championship match.
