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DEATH OF CONFUCIANISM MAY FOLLOW POLITICAL REVOLUTION

SAN FRANCISCO, February 7.—That Confucianism will fall with the ancient empire of the Manchus, that the reconstruction of China will be rapid and more amazing than the revolution changing established precedents of centuries, that a religious as well as political revolution has been occurring in China, and that, with all its immense and rich resources, China is poorer than the proverbial church mouse—these are among the many flashes of news brought from Wuchang, cradle of the rebellion, by Rev. Dudley Tyng. Rev. Mr. Tyng has just returned from the mission service of the American Episcopal church. He was stationed at Wuchang when the revolution broke out; he studied its progress to successful termination in the dethroning of the Manchus, and marked the growth of the unrest and sentiment crystallizing in the revolution.

While a man young in years, Rev. Mr. Tyng is analytical and has viewed the growth of Young China from the philosopher's standpoint. "It was the return of young Chinese students from studies abroad and their quickened perception of the weakness of China's position among other nations that precipitated the revolution," he declared. "They declared this position could not be changed until China had made a clean sweep of the Manchu oppressors. China was graft riddled. Its entire system was one of graft from the lowest to the highest official of government. The railroad situation out of Wuchang brought matters to a head. It was proposed by the provinces to build one road west from Hankow, which is just across the Yang-tse Kiang from Wuchang, and another from Hankow through Wuchang to Canton. The central government snubbed the provincial delegations and proposed a bond issue of \$40,000,000 with which to build the proposed roads under central government supervision. Mor-

ally afraid of graft eating the major portion of the funds, provincial officials protested. They were kicked out by the Manchus. They became easy allies of the student movement. One instance readily illustrating the situation was that of Tan Hua Lung, head of the provincial assembly of Hupeh. He was snubbed by the Manchus and when the rebellion broke out was found at the head of the revolutionary party in his province.

"At first there was no disposition on the part of the revolutionary party to spare the Manchus. All were slain as soon as captured. Later there was a reversion of feeling, so that when the imperial fleet went over to the rebels the officers were given \$1000 each and told to go their way.

"Foreigners were always protected. We were told whenever an engagement would likely throw shells our way. Had foreign intervention occurred, however, we would have been attacked by both parties. The younger party was particularly afraid that foreign powers would seize the opportunity of grabbing the empire.

"Contrary to the general understanding, the government will not be by popular vote. The common people will not receive the franchise for some time. The more educated and wealthy and the stronger men will control the government. It is the announced policy to advance as rapidly as the poverty of China will admit. Educational advancement will be first. At present the young Chinese are politely bowing out the Manchus. The wiser of the Manchus are making the best terms they can.

"I don't believe, from the tenor of affairs, that a life presidency will evolve. The American plan of presidential terms is favored.

"China is now ripe for a religious revolution that must soon follow. Confucianism will leap into the background, probably to emerge in after years purified and modernized. The religion of ancient China will die hard. Its votaries will probably hold to its customs of parental recognition and respect, and many other of its better principles. It will probably be much as Buddhism in Japan, brought down to date and offered in opposition to Christianity. Christianity has been held back in China because of parental objection. Young Chinese will not accept Christian creeds unless with parental sanction. Now the cry is, 'Dr. Sun Yat Sen is a Christian, why not me?'"

TOO MANY WIVES, TOO MUCH MUSIC

LOS ANGELES, February 6.—N. E. Brown had eight wives, seven pianos, four bass drums, a collection of rattle and snare drums, rattles, cymbals and other noise producers, with a corresponding set of discords and troubles, and he was sent to the Southern California Hospital for the insane yesterday.

Mrs. Laura Brown, one of the wives, swore to the complaint. She did not appear for the hearing, however, and the suggestion was made that she probably didn't relish the idea of facing seven other Mrs. Browns.

Brown, who doesn't appear unbalanced on anything except spouses and musical instruments, which he didn't take seriously, but on the installment plan. When one—a wife or a piano—was taken away from him for inattention or lack of payment, he would at once woo or buy another on the same basis. He was fond of playing unusual pranks on some of the wives, such as leaving them at the altar, bouquet in hand, waiting vainly to be escorted to a happy home. On the pianos he played worse than pranks, for he is unmusical, and his noises drove cats, dogs and human neighbors away.
