LATEST NEWS BULLETIN.

(Originating the Day the Steamer Sailed.)

Mayor Rolph of San Francisco has started a campaign looking toward the issuing of \$5,000,000 worth of bonds to be used in building a magnificent "civic center."

William Dean Howells, author, recently celebrated his seventy-fifth birthday.

San Francisco has started an agitation to prevent the taxicab companies from fleeing strangers to the city.

Half a million people in London watched cavalry and solid phalanxes of infantry break up a "votes for women" meeting.

Miss Dorothy Taylor, a New York society girl, is the latest to announce her engagement to Grahame-White, the aviator.

General Orozco, who deserted Madero, is getting 50,000 men together for an attack on Mexico City.

In local Maine elections yesterday the Republicans elected three Republican and seven Democratic mayors.

Lawrence, Mass., child strikers testified before Congress that the police repeatedly clubbed and hurt women and children.

The California oil industry is threatened by water in the wells. Oilmen must take prompt measures or many wells will be ruined.

Theodore Roosevelt says his inclinations and strong desire to remain in "obscurity" were overcome by the popular demand that he run.

Champ Clark has promised San Francisco that he will oppose any move to close the San Francisco mint.

WESTERN NEWS.

(Originating West of the Mississippi River.)

Santa Clara college, near San Jose, is to be enlarged, and will be made into the first Catholic university west of the Rocky Mountains.

Captain Albert Berry leaped from an aeroplane at Jefferson Barracks, St. Louis, and descended to the earth in a parachute, the first time that such a landing has been made.

The East Asiatic Steamship Company, a new line, will operate between European ports and Portland, San Francisco and Puget Sound.

A Salem (Ore.) mother, unable to support her four young children, gave each one of them a drink of cyanide and then committed suicide herself.

Immigration officials captured a speedy launch in San Francisco harbor which was trying, under cover of darkness, to land twenty-one Chinamen, smuggled in from Mexico.

A veteran of the Civil War, living in Montana, has just received a check of \$41 from the government, paying for the use of horses furnished by him for the war.

The Southern Pacific will soon have its line from San Francisco to Sacramento double-tracked.

John D. Spreckels and Adolph Spreckels have purchased two small railroads running out of San Diego and will extend the lines to Pasadena on the south and Los Angeles on the north.

The extra 1912 session of the Nevada legislature adjourned permanently without amending the divorce prizefight law, and having defeated a corporation tax law.

No director or employee of the Panama-Pacific exposition shall have any interest, direct or indirect, in any concession at the World's Fair, according to a decision recently reached by the managers of the exposition.

Robert Lovett, head of the Harriman system of railroads, is making an inspection of railroad property on the Pacific Coast in company with railroad men and bankers.

Thieves attacked the president of an Italian bank in San Jose, gagged him and made off with \$4500 from the bank's vault.

EASTERN NEWS.

(Originating East of the Mississippi River.)

Sunday, March 17, will be observed throughout the country with exercises in memory of Grover Cleveland, who was born seventy-five years ago.

Mrs. Isabella Goodwin, a New York police matron whose efforts led to the capture of the taxicab robbers, has been made a first grade detective at a salary of \$2250.

President Taft has warned Americans to leave Mexico. He intimates that unless Congress authorizes him to send troops across the border he is compelled to abandon the policy of the Monroe doctrine.

Government experts who investigated the Steel Trust disclosed the fact that the trust earned a billion dollars in nine years and that J. P. Morgan got \$70,000,000 for organizing the concern.

Jack London, the novelist, with his wife and a Japanese man-servant, have shipped on board the ship Dirigo for a trip around the Horn.

The Keystone Watch Case Company has filed an absolute denial of the charges of combination and conspiracy in opposition to the Sherman anti-trust law.

A hard fight by California Congressmen has prevented the Democratic majority eliminating the San Francisco mint.

J. R. Etchison of St. Joseph, Mo., who recently inherited \$100,000, has been found destitute and penniless at Tampa, Florida. He has been robbed of everything and is almost insane.

England, Russia, Germany and France have responded favorably to the United States' invitation to place themselves on record for the continued integrity of China.

President Taft is to start a vigorous speech-making campaign on March 17.

The House committee on naval affairs will recommend the building of two new battleships this year.

Mrs. Annie Yeamans, America's "grand old woman of the stage," has just died in New York.

The government is allowing one month's grace to manufacturers to eliminate the use of saccharine in prepared foods.

J. Pierpont Morgan's European art treasures, valued at \$50,000,000, are rapidly being brought to this country to be placed in the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York city.

Senator Joseph Dixon of Missouri has been selected as manager of Theodore Roosevelt's coming campaign.

It is said that President Taft has offered the position of Secretary of Agriculture to three different men, and the present secretary, Wilson, will retire very shortly.

Several English nobles have brought suit against Henry E. Huntington of Los Angeles, whom they claim made false and fraudulent representations in the sale of stock.

FOREIGN NEWS.

It is said that unless the coal miners' strike in England is settled shortly millions of workers in various trades will walk out, practically paralyzing British industries.

General Orozco, one of Madero's principal generals, has joined the rebel forces and is preparing to hold the state of Chihuahua.

Mexican rebels at Juarez have reduced import duties 50 per cent to stimulate trade and thus gain funds to continue the insurrection.

The Crown Princess of Sweden, daughter of the Duke of Connaught, governor general of Canada, has given birth to a third son.

Clever sneak thieves working in Paris hotels have robbed hundreds of guests of jewelry, furs and other valuables. The robbers concentrate on Americans.

English newspapers comment on the fact that newly rich Americans have stolen many English coats-of-arms for their own use.

Many fashionable Parisiennes are having pictures of their loved ones photographed on their finger nails. A transparent shellac over the nail preserves the picture.

On account of the socialist victory the Kaiser is considering starting a paper of his own in Berlin. He wants to model it after the London Times with a dash of American method, to make it popular.

The famous English cutter Galatea, which was defeated for the America cup by the Mayflower in 1885, is being broken up.

Queen Mary of England has been greatly annoyed by freak gowns worn on court occasions, and the rules of dress which obtained at the end of Queen Victoria's reign are to be put in force.
