## KAMS AND ST. LOUIS SCORE IN GRAMMAR SCHOOL MEET

The honors at the Grammar School Athletic League's sports held at Alexander Field on Saturday were shared by the Kamehameha and St. Louis athletes.

Ninety-nine boys competed in the various events in the different classes. Class A was for boys of over 100 pounds and Class B for boys under 100 pounds.

The total totals of the seven schools entered follow:

Class A—Kamehameha, 29; St. Louis College, 23; Punahou Preparatory School, 15; Central Grammar School, 9; Mills School, 1.

Class B—St. Louis College, 15; Mills School, 11; Punahou Preparatory School, 8; Iolani, 7; Central Grammar School, 6; Kaulani, 3.

Eight former Grammar League records were broken and two were equalled.

In Class A, George Frenzo won four first places for St. Louis College, his figures in the 100-yards, pole vault and broad jump establishing new Grammar League records.

In Class B, John Bettencourt, another St. Louis student, won the fifty and 100 yards dashes and the broad jump. He broke the record in the first and third events and equaled it in the second.

One of the best performances was Frenzo's broad jump of 20 feet 1 1/2 inches.


