MR. THWING AND BISHOP BASHFORD CRITICIZED FOR DOINGS IN CHINA

(By J. K. OHI in New York Herald.)
PEKIN, February 10, 1912.—It is asserted here that the responsible authorities of some American missionary and philanthropic societies interested in the China field have sharply reprimanded certain of their representatives out here for having permitted themselves to become actively involved in the Chinese political situation.
If such reprimands have not been sent, they should be, for there is real danger that the activities of these men may work serious harm to the missionary cause.
The great majority of missionary workers in China have scrupulously refrained from mixing in politics. The offenders, for the most part, are Americans and Englishmen.
Bishop Bashford, of the American Methodist Church, is reported in the newspapers to have delivered himself of an impassioned speech to an audience of young revolutionaries, to the general effect that "the hand of the Almighty is in this revolution." But I understand a good many of the workers under him, particularly those in the north, have expressed deep concern lest the mission cause in the northern provinces be seriously damaged by what is, not unnaturally, construed as open advocacy of rebellion. Whether or not this fear of injury to the work of the Church is warranted, the fact that it is held is at least circumstantial evidence in support of the contention that intermeddling by missionaries in the politics of the country of their residence is unwise.
Condemned by Press.
The activities of these missionaries have been much criticized by leading newspapers in China. One result of this criticism has been to give wide publicity to what these men have said and done, and with the result of promoting discussion among the Chinese of their acts. It is the sort of discussion that bodes no good for the cause. For China is still China.
The Rev. E. W. Thwing is the representative in China of the International Reform Bureau. He signaled his debut in China by launching a crusade against the deadly cigarette. The British-American Tobacco Company, with its output of millions upon millions of deadlies, purchasable by devotees at ten for half a cent and a picture of a pirate thrown in, was too much for Mr. Thwing, so he next turned his attention to the more serious problem of inducing the Manchus to donate large tracts of Pekin property for public parks. The seriousness of this problem consisted in, first, the fact that nobody in Pekin wanted a public park, and second, the even more convincing fact that no Manchus prince ever was known to separate himself from his property if he could help it—and he usually could.
His Opium War.
Then Mr. Thwing turned his attention to opium. In this field he did some good by connecting the various provincial anti-opium societies into a national organization.
The revolution put the anti-opium crusade out of business. Also, it may be remarked in passing, it has practically undone all the good work that had been accomplished, since there has been widespread replanting of the poppy from the time the imperial hold over a large portion of the country was loosened.
But this did not lessen the activities of the Rev. Mr. Thwing; it only diverted these activities into another channel. He lost no time jumping into the middle of the political fray. He went about Shanghai unloading the veils of his eloquence upon revolutionary audiences, shaking the shining stars of the blue empyrean with his impassioned tributes to "our" rainbow flag—the same being the flag of the republic. The columns of Shanghai newspapers during the days of excitement furnish ample evidence that the reverend gentleman was quite an orator.
The American Legation, and I understand the Department of State, received considerable advice from the Rev. Mr. Thwing concerning the importance of the United States government according formal recognition to the "republic" at Nanking. Yuan Shih Kai was not permitted to escape bombardment from the Thwing guns, and the high water mark of his effort was a telegram to the imperial princess advising abdication!
All this would be ludicrous if it did not have a decidedly serious side. The impropriety of foreigners of any kind or color interfering in the internal politics of a country in which they happen to reside is manifest. If this is true of the merchant and kindred classes, it is even more true of those whose mission it is to preach the gospel of peace.
Whether it is just to the cause they represent for these gentlemen to be devoting any portion of their time to politics may concern only those who contribute to their support.
Whether the missionary and social reform causes are benefited or injured by their co-operation in a revolu-
