Seven miles of country road and city street were lined with people for hours yesterday afternoon, watching the coming in of the marathon racers from Wailua.

The Methodist Sunday school held its annual picnic yesterday at the Diamond Head beach in a beautiful grove, old and young having a splendid time with games, swimming and feasting.

A jolly time was had by the little tots at the celebration on Monday of the birthday of Dorothy Castle, in whose memory and that of her father, Henry N. Castle, the Castle Kindergarten on King street was founded. It was held on the grounds of that institution.

The annual picnic of the Christian church Sunday school was held in the Japanese gardens of Hon. S. M. Damon at Moanalua yesterday. There was a large turnout of the congregation and school, and the day amidst the beautiful scenes, with healthful

zephyrs blowing, was passed most pleasantly.

Fifty members of the Order of Kamehameha lodge of Honolulu yesterday morning decorated the statue of Kamehameha in front of the Judiciary building. Chang Hoon, the kauhau all, delivered an address. A cavalcade of horsemen paraded around the statue. The old Portuguese statue worshiper performed his devotions as usual, later in the day, standing on the sidewalk in front of the Capitol.

The war department yesterday called authorization to Captain Edwards, constructing quartermaster, to take as much of the Wailua water passing down the north and south forks of the Kaula stream, Lelohua, from the Koolau range as the brigade post at Schofield Barracks requires. Sixty thousand dollars is authorized for the installation of this system and construction, and the constructing quartermaster is to commence work at an early date.

Honolulu Planing Mill, conducted by Lucas Brothers, has protested against the bid of Pingle, Dunn & Co., San Francisco, for constructing the military hospital at Fort Shafter. It being a lump sum for all the buildings instead of separate bids for the three buildings as specified in the call for tenders. The San Francisco firm's bid was \$62,000 for all, while the three bids of Honolulu Planing Mill totaled \$67,000, and those of Pacific Engineering Co. \$69,000.

CLEANUP DAY  
PLANS SETTLED

At a conference of district captains for Cleanup day with Acting Governor Mott-Smith on Monday afternoon in the governor's office, the plan of campaign was thoroughly gone over with the aid of maps. Each captain present received a map with his district marked out on it, and Mr. Mott-Smith explained the use of the inspection blanks that had been prepared.

After the meeting of captains was over, B. von Damm, president of the Cleanup day executive committee, called that body also present to order, when several matters were decided. It was announced, the meeting ratifying the action, that the executive board of the central improvement committee had obtained the use of rooms in the Magoon building at Alakea and Merchant streets, for headquarters and selected Will J. Cooper, who had charge of the clerical work last year, as secretary at headquarters for the campaign.

It was decided that, instead of replying by letter to the offer of W. M. Giffard, president of the board of agriculture and forestry, of the use of the fruitful control force and equipment, the executive committee should confer with him personally, especially with regard to the disposition of fallen manure that are infested.

First inspection day will be on Saturday next. Cleanup day, a public holiday, will be on the Thursday following, and final inspection day the next Saturday.

## DR. GOODSPEED.

A fine name for a minister of the Gospel! And Honolulu will soon welcome one who well fits the name. Rev. Frank L. Goodspeed, D. D., pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Oakland, will supply the pulpit of Central Union church, by exchange with Dr. Seudder, during August and the first two Sundays of September. Dr. Goodspeed is a graduate of Harvard College and of Boston University School of Theology. His first pastorate was at Mattapoisett, Mass., where, in 1886 or 1887, the late Dr. J. T. Smith of Koloa called upon him to induce him to come to Hawaii to superintend the work of the American Board here. His next settlement was for four years in Amherst, Mass., and then in Springfield for fourteen years.

The First Congregational Church there grew under his care from a membership of 963 to 1195. In 1907 he was vice-moderator of the National Congregational Council, which elected him a delegate to the International Council in Edinburgh. He has seen wide and important service in the missionary boards of this church. A tall, large man of splendid presence and a preacher of real power, he will delight and inspire the people of this city. Central Union church renders Honolulu a large service by bringing men of Dr. Goodspeed's caliber hither for the summer campaign—"The Friend."

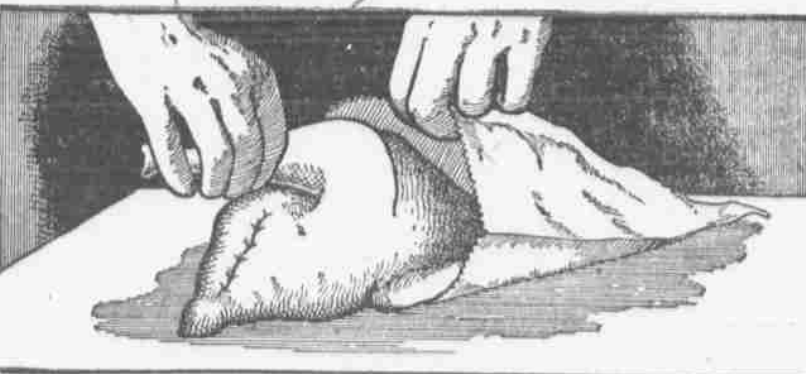
