LETTERS BY OVERLAND MAIL.-Ten thousand one hundred and ninety-seven letters were sent off by the last Overland Mail, of which two hundred and eleven were for way-stations. During the month of February sixty-three thousand and thirty letters were forwarded from this State, and thirty-eight thousand six hundred and seventy-four were received during the same menth by Overland Mail.

DEPARTURE OF THE STEAMERS .- The Golden Gate, of the Pacific Mail Steamship Company's line, left Folsom-street wharf yesterday at ten o'clock A. M., taking with her 360 passengers, and \$924,000 in treasure. The Cortes left at two P. M., the lateness of the hour of her arrival last Saturday, having ne cossitated her delay. She carried out 242 passengers and \$145,847 in treasure. The amount of money taken by the two steamers was comparatively small. SENTENCE OF CAPTAIN LUNT .- The case of Captain Henry W. Lunt, of the British ship Blondel, indicted for resistance to, and assault upon, U. S. Deputy Marshal Williams, came up for trial before the U. S. Circuit Court, and had resulted in a verdict of guilty. Judge M'Alister sentenced him to be imprisoned two months and pay a fine of \$300. In the case of W. Jamieson, first officer of the Blondel, a nolle protequi was entered, and the defendant discharged.

THE WASHOE SILVER MINES .- The Alla states that a scientific German miner has been to the Washoe silver mines and made estimate that the probable production of the veins already opened will not be less than \$10,000,000 during the present year. The ore pays \$5,000 of silver to the ton, and the silver contains \$6,000 of gold to the ton. During the month of January last 58,000 ounces, or two and five-twelfths tons-at 24,000 Troy ounces to a ton-of Washoe silver were deposited at the Mint, and these two tons contained \$12,213 of gold.

House Express Overland .-- A Horse Express is to be run between the termini of the two telegraph lines at a high rate of speed, so in a week from the time an English steamer touches at Halifax we shall have the news in San Francisco. This will be a grand achievement.

Russell & Majors' Overland horse express will leave Leavenworth on 11th April. Three hundred additional horses have been purchased for the line. The time between Missouri and California is to be made inside of one week, by help of the telegraph lines at the two ends. Coming here for the first time at the present session, to be associated with you as a member, no event could have been more unlooked for than that I should be called upon to preside over your deliberations; and my friends will do me the justice to say that I have not sought the position, as I certainly never desired it. I um, nevertheless, as conscious of the dignity and importance of this high office as any gentleman can be; out I should have been far better pleased could its duties have been entrusted to abler and more experienced hands. After witnessing the almost insurmountable obstacles in the way of an organization of this House, I came to the conclusion that any gentleman, of any party, who could command a majority of votes for Speaker, was bound, in deference to public exigencies, to accept the responsibility as an act of patriotic duty, whether it was agreeable to his personal feeling or not. As that choice has unexpectedly fallen on me, I have not besitated to accept it. In the execution of this high trust, my object will be to to my duty with impartiality and justice to all.

I shall have great necessity, gentlemen, for your reluigence in the new position in which I am placed, and I feel entire confidence that I shall receive it at your hands. A Representative from the State of New Jersey, upon whose soil so many brilliant achievements were accomplished in the Revolutionary war, and whose people have ever been distinguished for devotion to the Union and Constitution, I pray the Great Arbiter of our destinies that I may do no act to impair either, but that by wise and prudent counsels peace and prosperity may yet reign in our midst, and our free institutions may be perpetuated to our descendants. I feel that I have a national heart embracing all parts of our Union. Again thanking you for your kindness, I now enter upon the duties of that arduous and responsible station.

A commercial treaty between France and England was signed at Paris on the 22d of January, and has given rise to various speculations in that city. Its terms have not yet transpired. Respecting them various rumors are affoat. It is said that the English Government has frankly carried out its franchises of free-trade; that coals will be relieved of all but the differential duty; that the duty on manufactured iron will be lowered about one-half, and that the French and English flags, in maritime intercourse, will be completely and effectively assimilated, and that the ships of both nations will be relieved from tonnage dues in the ports of England and France.

The commercial treaty between France and England continued to excite much speculation. The Constitutional publishes several articles of the treaty as the following: On and after July 1 next, the im port duties on cotton and wool will be suppressed. English coal and coke will be subject to the same duties as in Belgium. 
