NOTES OF THE WEEK.

DR. ANDERSON.—In the S. F. Bulletin, weekly, of the 8th August, is an outline of an address delivered by the Rev. Dr. A. at the Rev. Dr. Lucy's church, his subject being the Protestant Mission at the Sandwich Islands. A large audience listened with great interest and attention to a very interesting description of his visit and what he saw and learned while here. The Rev. E. G. Beckwith followed with some remarks, and the benediction was pronounced by the Rev. A. Thurston. On the Wednesday evening following, he delivered an address at the Rev. T. Starr King's Church. He left San Francisco on the steamer of the 13th July, for the East.

NEW POSTAGE LAW.—By the Comet, the Postmaster-General received a copy of the new American Postal Law, which went into effect on the 1st of July last, relating the postage on letters mailed from the Pacific coast to any part of the United States, from ten cents formerly, to three cents, so that the through postage on single letters from these islands, will now be only ten cents—that is, 3c. American, 2c. sea, and 5c. Hawaiian, with 8c. additional charge for every extra half ounce. A reduction of 5c. has also been made on letters for Great Britain, which reduces the postage on them from 35c. to 31c.

Correspondence of the Pacific Commercial Advertiser.


HONOLULU, September 1st, 1863.

MR. EDITOR.—Will you oblige me by finding space in the next issue of your newspaper for these few remarks with relation to your harmless criticism on my sermon in your last. First, by way of apology, allow me to state that I was unable to correct the proof sheet in consequence of my absence from Honolulu. Had I seen it, I should have rectified some few errors, e. g. p. 4, line 24, instead of "and the thought" read "to the thought"; "and the me" from the Hebrew root "tzal," leaving this simple form "tzal" or "t-zal-m." I have by me at present readings in Hebrew from the book of Genesis by a German Hebraist; and in a note on the text he gives "tzal" as the assigned—though unproved—root to the word in question, meaning "to cast a shade" or "be shady." I have only an English edition of Gesenius' Grammar in my library, and that of course does not help me in the subject of roots. I stand corrected in the matter of the prefix with its usual pointing; but I had really taken it for granted that it would be understood by even the ordinary reader to be what it is.

I thank you, sir, for quoting Gen. 5:3—"Adam began a son in his likeness, after his shade." A melancholy contrast this verse to our text, God said, "Let us make man in our image [shadow] after our likeness." The shadow or shade is now controverted, spoiled by original sin! Secondly, you object thus: "But nothing is gained in giving a new translation of the Hebrew word unless it can be shown that the Greek word εἶμα has the same meaning in 2 Cor. 3:18." Why so? But had it been necessary I could have done so. Indeed I prefer the word εἶμα to any other for the Greek translation of the Hebrew. It expresses idea embodied much better than the literal Greek translation "skin" would; for you are no doubt aware that skin bears the signification of a "phantom-semblance," "a shadow," and by no means conveys the same notion as even the other Greek word for "image," namely εἰδωλον. The Latin "imago" in like manner bears the sense of "idea." Thirdly, you accuse me of materialism, now let us understand each other. I mean by materializing God, making the Divine essence to be tangible and local. This is simply impossible and therefore utterly false. But to connect the Divine essence with matter is not materialism. It is the essential truth of the Incarnation, as the creed of our church asserts that God was made man "not by the conversion of the Godhead into flesh, but by the taking of the manhood into God." It is an accession of an inferior nature to the superior. Lastly, I regret that you should differ from Holy Scripture and the mind of the Universal Church in your view of our Lord's human nature. The Bible declares that Jesus was made of a woman, and that "inasmuch as the children are partakers of flesh and blood, it behooved Him (Jesus) also to take part of the same." And the church declares, as the article of my own (English) church expresses it, that Jesus was "born of the Virgin Mary of her substance." An error, such as yours, called "Eutychian heresy," was condemned by the 3d General Council of the undivided church at Ephesus. I hope, sir, you will reconsider this matter.

Earthquake at Manila!

By the arrival of the bark Comet, Captain James Smith, we have received San Francisco papers to the 13th of August, from the East to July 18, and European papers to June 27, all inclusive. The telegraphic dates from the East come down to the 11th of August. The news, which we present below, will be found interesting.

FORTRESS MONROE, July 24th.—The Richmond Whig says Jackson (Miss.) was left in the hands of the federals with the rolling stock of the New Orleans and Jackson and the Great Northern Mississippi and Tennessee Railroads, and a motive power consisting of forty engines and locomotives.

A Federal cavalry raid from Newbern (N. C.) reached Rocky Mount, on the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad, July 20th, destroyed two miles of the track and burned the bridge over the Tar river, thus cutting off communication for some weeks.

New York, July 27th.—From the Herald's account of the operations near Charleston we take the following: The rebels attempted to drive our forces from James Island. The attack was sudden and unexpected, but General Terry met and repulsed them with great slaughter. During the night, which supported the left flank, grounded, and a rebel battery opened on her, firing fifty shots, thirty-nine of which struck her. Subsequently she floated off, and opening upon the rebels put them to flight.

Gen. Gilmore's terrific Bombardment of Ft. Wagner.—The Assault and Repulse.

Chicago, July 20th.—A correspondent of the New York Herald, writing from Morris Island, July 19th, says: Since the engagement on July 11th, General Gilmore had strained every nerve to strengthen his position on this island. Another attack on the enemy's works was determined on. The design was, to commence the bombardment at daylight, but on account of a terrific thunder storm the action did not commence until noon. At that hour the Monitor, Ironsides, Catskill, Nantucket, Hebecheau, and Ironsides moved into line within a mile of Fort Wagner, and commenced hurling their heaviest shot and shell into the Fort. With intervals of but a few minutes they continued this bombardment until an hour after sundown. Just after the close of the engagement, and a few minutes before the assault, the Monitor ran directly under the guns of Wagner, and within three hundred yards, and fired several rounds, making one huge sandheap of that portion of the fort facing the sea, and dismounting two of the heaviest guns. During all this time, fifty-four guns from our land batteries kept up a continuous fire on the rebel works. Although the fort mounted thirteen rifled guns of heavy caliber, it responded to reply with only two, one upon the right and one upon the left, and one upon the entire line of batteries. They fired about one shot to our hundred, though that is rather over than under the estimate. For the assault General Strong was assigned to the command of the First Brigade, Colonel Putnam to the Second, and General Stevenson to the Third. The assaulting column, just as darkness began to fall, General Strong's brigade advanced to the assault. At the instant the line was being slowly advancing toward the fort, and before the first quick was ordered, a tremendous fire from the guns of Sumter, from the batteries on Cummings Point, and from all Wagner's guns, opened upon them. The guns from Wagner swept the beach; those from Sumter and Cummings Point enfiladed us. In the midst of this terrible fire the brigade reached the fort, dashed through the ditch, gained the parapet, and engaged in a hand to hand fight. For nearly a half hour they held their ground and did not fall back till nearly every commissioned officer was shot down. The First Brigade having failed, the Second made an attempt, carrying through the same terrible fire. Colonel Putnam led his men over into the fort, and on his hour held off it, fighting every moment and with the utmost desperation, like the First Brigade. It was not until Putnam himself fell, killed, and nearly all his officers wounded, and no reinforcements arriving, that his men fell back. The rebel shout of victory was heard above the roar of the guns of Sumter and Cummings Point.

The correspondents assign no reason for the failure of General Stevenson to come to the assistance of the assaulting column.

A beautiful correspondent, under date of July 23d, states that prisoners taken say the rebel loss during the fight on Saturday, July 18th, was 500.

The Second Assault.

New York, July 27th.—The details of the charge made on July 23d on Fort Wagner show most desperate fighting by General Strong's brigade. Scarcely by a field or a line officer escaped a wound, and many were killed. Meantime nearly the whole rebel force was concentrated upon the Fifty-fourth Massachusetts, the colored regiment. The latter fought heroically, and only retired when the others did. Colonel Putnam in command of the storming party, after he had gained a part of the fort, planted the flag on the parapet and sent to Generals Strong and Seymour for reinforcements; but both of these Generals were being decimated by rebel grape. When Stevenson's brigade arrived under to advance was given, but it was too late—our gallant boys had been forced to retire.

FRANKFORT (Ky.) July 26th.—John J. Crittenden died at half past three this morning, of general debility, at the age of seventy-seven years.

Capture of Huntsville, Alabama.

New York, July 26th.—A letter dated Winchester, Tennessee, July 18th, announces the capture of Huntsville, Alabama, with three hundred prisoners and twelve hundred horses and mules, by General Stanley.

The Rebel John Morgan and his Command Captured.

CINCINNATI, July 26th.—A telegram from General Sherman, dated New Lisbon, Ohio, says: "I have succeeded in capturing General John H. Morgan, Colonel Clarke and the balance of their command, amounting to about four hundred men."

New York, July 27th.—A letter to the Herald, dated Jackson (Miss.) July 12th, says: The library of Jeff Davis was captured, comprising several bundles of private political papers of the arch traitor, and several letters upon secession, of dates back to 1852. The whole collection brings to light the secret history of secession. There are letters from both Northern and Southern traitors.

New York, July 28th.—We have but few particulars of the battle on Thursday, July 23d, at Harper's

Ferry. A telegram to the Philadelphia Inquirer says: The result of the engagement, as reported here, is highly encouraging. The intention was to cut Lee's army in two, which was successful, to the extent that Ewell's corps has been entirely cut off from communication with Lee.

New York, July 28th.—The Charleston Mercury's account of the late attack on Fort Wagner admits that our forces held their position in the fort for an hour, and were then captured. Six hundred of them were killed. The loss of the enemy is estimated at one hundred. The account says the bombardment was terrific, but the men were amply protected by bomb proofs.

CINCINNATI, July 28th.—John Morgan, with the officers who were captured at the same time, arrived here last night. One hundred and fifty-six of his officers, who have been in confinement for several days, have been sent to Johnson's Island, Lake Erie.

ATLANTA (Ga.) July 28th.—Roosecrans is organizing a force to attack the Western Georgia Railroad. Active preparations have been made for the defense of the city and the railroad to Chattanooga.

New York, July 30th.—The Tribune's Morris Island correspondence says: Our entire loss in the late assault on the Fifty-fourth Massachusetts (colored), which was captured, will not be given up. Unofficial reports say the negroes will be sold into slavery. The officers were treated with unmeasured abuse. In fact all the wounded left in the hands of the rebels were captured, and subsequently a retaliation being performed by rebel surgeons in cases of the slightest gunshot wounds.

Threatened Retaliation for Rebel Outrages.

WASHINGTON, August 1st.—The National Republican of this evening contains the following announcement: The President has authorized the issue of an order to the effect that it will be the policy and intention of the Government to retaliate in kind for every case of ill treatment of our officers or men, black or white, by the rebel authorities, by hanging for hanging, shooting for shooting, and burning in every instance where it is known that a black man in the military service of the United States are taken prisoners and sold into slavery, our military authorities will be instructed to select rebel prisoners and confine them to hard labor in some prison, there to remain until the black man, or the white man, the Government maintains, and will exact promptly and to the letter, that the Federal officer, like the flag, must and shall be respected.

Draft to be Completed in New York.

New York, August 1st.—A Washington special dispatch says an order has been issued by Provost Marshal General Fry, to complete the draft in this city immediately, and the drafting will again commence. The Government is fully prepared for any emergency.

Three Thousand Bales of Cotton Seized by Admiral Porter.

WASHINGTON, August 1st.—Admiral Porter in a communication to the Navy Department, says: "I am not yet sure of raising the De Kalb, sunk by the explosion of a mine on the 27th of July, but I am ascertaining her injuries. Her guns and everything which could be got out have been removed." As the citizens of Yazoo City did not take the trouble to warn him of the torpedoes, as they had an opportunity of doing, he holds out the prospect of a reward of ten thousand dollars for the capture of the torpedoes which had come to that point.

New York, August 1st.—The steamer Belvidere, from Port Royal (S. C.) passed Charleston bar on the forenoon of Wednesday, July 29th. She saw two monitors engaging Wagner. General Gilmore had succeeded in sending a long line of batteries within three hundred yards of Wagner. He has also mounted heavy siege guns within a mile and a quarter of Sumter, which were to open on the fort on Wednesday, July 29th. The General feels confident of his ability to reduce Sumter.

Trouble for Jeff Davis in North Carolina.

FORTRESS MONROE, August 2d.—We have Newbern (N. C.) dates to August 1st. The Raleigh Standard denounces Jeff Davis as a repudiator, in whom no confidence can be placed and who is unfit to establish a Southern dynasty to be ruled by him. The Richmond Enquirer calls upon Jeff to suppress the Standard, and without the assent of the Supreme Court of North Carolina.

The Standard republishes the Governor Vance will stand by the Standard, and the Standard also, and that if Davis attempts to use physical force to suppress the paper, he will be met by physical force, and a revolution in the State will be the result. The Standard says North Carolina has furnished 90,000 lbs. of cotton for the war, 40,000 of whom have been killed and wounded, and that the State should send a delegation to Washington immediately to see what terms can be obtained.

A recent expedition from Norfolk to Jackson, Northampton county (N. C.) found the enemy strongly entrenched at that place, which commands the approach to Weldon.

New York, August 1st.—The New Orleans Delta says Brashear City, Louisiana, surrendered on July 22d to the Union gunboat Sackett. No particulars.

A Warlike Editorial in Washington.

WASHINGTON, August 5th.—The National Republican contains a warlike editorial, which is of great importance is attached. It says among other things: "If there shall be occasion for hostilities, and the two nations (the British and Americans) are likely to be involved in war, our steam marine will be at once converted into a fleet of ironclads, and the commerce of Great Britain will be swept from the ocean. This shows how the criminal neglect of the Queen of England's advisers tends to the disturbance of the peace of the world. War is not desirable, even with England, but war is inevitable, and the only way of spirit cannot submit to insolence and outrage through a series of years and make no effort to avenge its wrongs. The course of England during the trying period of our troubles has alienated every American of the West, who are by no means loyal upon the Administration or the conduct of the war. These are significant facts and indicate what a future is in store for us. The machinations of Napoleon in Mexico deserve attention and the country should bear in mind the great fact that the United States can restore Mexico to its place as a Republic whenever the attempt shall be made, and indeed it is not improbable that Napoleon will find an excuse for quitting a position which promises no good to the French Empire."

Interesting and Encouraging from Charleston.

New York, August 6th.—A Charleston letter, dated July 31st, says: The last day of July passes away with everything promising success, though not so soon as we may wish. All things are working well. We know that anxiety is felt in Charleston for the safety of the city. Last week there were hanging from the parapets of Sumter, as protection to the walls, lines of cotton bales. It told us plainly that fifteen-inch shot were equal to its destruction. But the cotton bales having been set on fire, as they were by their own guns, they were obliged to take them down. They are now piled up in scorched heaps behind the fort. Everything betokens fearlessness on the part of the rebels here, which is very encouraging to us.

Chicago, August 7th.—Yesterday's New York Herald says the Government is sending an enlarged naval force to the Pacific, and with this view the Commandant of the Naval rendezvous at that city is directed to make strenuous exertions to procure two hundred (?) men of each and different grades of service. They will be required to enlist for two years.

BALTIMORE, August 7th.—A flag of truce arrived at Fortress Monroe last evening. Jeff Davis had issued an urgent appeal to Confederate officers and soldiers to return immediately to their various camps. He complains of a want of alacrity on the part of all classes in coming forward in this most dismal hour of the South. The Richmond Examiner is gloomy over the prospects at Charleston, and says the fall of that place will be the most mortifying and disastrous event of the war, and a fatal blow to the cause of the Confederacy. The same paper says that Lee's troops are massed and ready for another battle. It claims that the army is in excellent condition and spirits.

BALTIMORE, August 7th.—The American's correspondent on board the flag ship Disunion, off Morris Island, Aug. 3d, says: All here are confident of success. No one seems to entertain the slightest doubt on the subject, and with such a feeling prevalent, failure is next to impossible. The great battle will open in the course of a week, and it will be a most furious fight. Wave moving buoys have been located from each of the monitors, and the Ironsides is within five hundred yards of Sumter. That Sumter will fall is, I think, as certain as that the day of attack will arrive. The enemy also is at work, erecting batteries on James Island, but we are putting up batteries to command them. Some of the monitors will go to-night to harass the enemy. Five hundred rebel prisoners were taken yesterday on the island in the rear of Folly Island; they showed but little fight, and after receiving two volleys laid down their arms. There has not been a dozen guns fired to-day, and they are principally from our water batteries. The enemy has been unusually quiet, evidently finding that he has been wasting a good deal of ammunition lately without gaining anything. The weather is hot. The arrival of reinforcements has given us very little information from Lee's army.

WASHINGTON, August 7th.—Articles are appearing in the journals of this city and elsewhere, representing war with Great Britain as imminent. The assumption that these articles are authorized by the Government, or made upon any knowledge of its views, is without foundation.
