Masterly Letter from Secretary Seward—The British Rebel Sympathizers Properly Rebuked.

The President recently sent a message to the Senate, in reply to Mr. Sumner's resolution calling upon him, if not incompatible with the public interest, to furnish the Senate with any information in his possession relative to a proposition of British subjects to give aid to the rebellion. Lord Warrincliff informs Mr. Adams that the Liverpool Bazaar produced about £17,000, and asks permission for an accredited agent to visit the military prisons within the Northern States and distribute aid to their inmates. He denies that any political aid is aimed at, or any intimation that Confederates are to be deprived of such attentions as the ordinary rules enjoin. He says:

"The issue of the great contest will not be determined by individual suffering, but by the greater or lesser aid, which, under the name of humanity, is given to the American history, cannot view with indifference the sufferings of American citizens, whatever their state and opinions."

Mr. Adams replied "that it has never been the desire of the Government to resort to unnecessary or vindictive severity any of the misguided individual parties in this deplorable rebellion who have fallen into its hands in the regular course of the war, and that he should greatly rejoice if the effects of such sympathy could be extended to ministering to their mental and physical sufferings, thus contributing to put an end to a struggle which otherwise is too likely to be only protracted by their English sympathizers."

Mr. Seward replies as follows to the application received through Mr. Adams:

DEPARTMENT OF STATE, WASHINGTON, December 6, 1864.

Sir—I have received your dispatch of the 18th of November, No. 897, together with the papers therein mentioned, namely, a copy of a letter which was addressed to you on the 17th of November last by Lord Warrincliff, and a copy of the letter in reply to that letter. Your proceeding in that matter is approved. You will now inform Lord Warrincliff that permission for an agent of the Committee described by him to visit the insurgents detained in military prisons throughout the States, and to contribute among them £17,000 in British gold, is disallowed.

Here it is expected your correspondence with Lord Warrincliff will end. That correspondence will necessarily become public. On reading it, the American people will be well aware that while the United States have ample means for the support of prisoners, as well as for every other exigency of the war in which they are engaged, the insurgents who have blindly rushed into that condition are suffering no privations that appeal for relief to charity, either at home or abroad.

The American people will be likely to reflect that the sum thus inconsiderately tendered in the name of humanity, constitutes a large part of the profits which its contributors may be justly supposed to have derived from the insurgents by exchanging with them arms and munitions of war for the coveted productions of immoral and enervating slave labor, nor will any portion of the American people be disposed to regard the sum thus ostentatiously offered for the relief of captured insurgents as a too generous equivalent for the devastation and desolation which a civil war, promoted and protracted by British subjects, has spread throughout States which before were eminently prosperous and happy.

Finally, in view of this last obvious intervention in our domestic affairs, the American people can hardly fail to recall the warning of the father of our country, directed against the great and sinister contemplated public dangers, namely, sectional faction and foreign intrigue.

I do not think the insurgents have become debased, although they have sadly wandered from the ways of loyalty and patriotism. I think that, in common with all our countrymen, they will rejoice in being saved by their considerate and loyal Government from the grave insult which Lord Warrincliff and his associates, in their zeal for the overthrow of the United States, have prepared for the victims of this unnatural and hopeless rebellion.

OUR FIRST DECLARATION.—The "piece" we first attempted to "speak upon the stage," when a boy, began thus: "Education is a companion which no misfortune can depress—no crime can destroy—no enemy can alienate—no despotism enslave; at home a friend—abroad an introduction—in solitude a solace—and in society an ornament; it chastens vice—it guides virtue—it gives an ease and grace to government and genius." We commend this to our young readers—it is worthy a place in their memory.

LET OF THEIR GENERATION.—It is remarkable in many instances, how soon the line of descent of men of great genius has been cut off. We have no male descendants of William Shakespeare, Milton, Sir Walter Scott, or Lord Byron. Sir Isaac Newton left no heir. The male branch of Sir Christopher Wren's family is extinct, and the female line nearly so. The race of Sir Joshua Reynolds, Dr. Johnson, Oliver Goldsmith, Telford and Bradley have ceased to exist; and a hundred other famous names might be mentioned, to show to what a great extent this fact may be considered as a natural law. We had recently another illustration of this, when the grave closed upon the life of George Stephenson, without leaving any direct successor.

USE OF A CAT'S WHISKERS.—The use of these in a state of nature is very important. They are attached to a bed of glands under the chin, and each of these long hairs is connected with the nerves of the lip. The slightest contact of these whiskers with any surrounding object thus felt most distinctly by the animal, although the hairs themselves are insensible. Whiskers are a common appendage of the feline family. They stand out on each side of the lion as well as of the common cat; so that from point to point, they are equidistant to the width of the animal's body. If we imagine, therefore, a lion stealing through a covert of wood in an imperfect light, we shall at once see the use of these long hairs. They indicate to him, through the nicest feeling, any obstacle which may present itself to the passage of his body; they prevent the rustle of branches and leaves, which would give warning to his prey, if he were to attempt to pass through too close a bush; and thus, in conjunction with the soft cushions of his feet, and the fat upon which he treads—the retractile claws never coming in contact with the ground—they enable him to move towards his victim with a stealth even greater than that of the snake, who creeps along the grass, and is not perceived until he is coiled round his prey.
