New York Correspondence-No. 28. The Great Gold Panic-Fisk and his doings-The

Gold Room - Results of the Flurry.

[FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.]

New York, Oct. 1, 1869. New York bonsts of a grand sensation at the resent moment. It is the great gold flurry, which commenced a week ago to-day, a storm of which the billows are still heaving strongly, though the stress of the tempest has blown over. Vanderbilt and Fisk are supposed to have been the principal movers in the panie; but they both discreetly keep out of harm's way during its coninuance, fearing to provoke the commission of assuit and battery upon their own persons by some of the many men whose pecuniary ruin they have accomplished. I happen to be acmainted with one of the victims,-a gentleman who was worth \$200,000 last Friday morning. when the price of gold jumped from 133 to 162 and then fell as suddenly. Those terrible leaps threw him; he is almost penniless to-day; and instead of the trip to Europe which he planned, he is forced to begin again at the bottom of the hill. Several cases of insanity are privately reported as having occurred among prominent Speyers, the broker, one of the most natorious among the men who have endeavored make money at the expense of personal honesty of the government credit, was happily ng the chief sufferers. Baring Brothers, of London, during the height of the excitement of week, telegraphed to their broker in the New York Gold Room to sell \$10,000,000 on their account. Speyers bought nine millions of this amount at 160; but the Barings can cover" at 130, making a profit of 30 cents upon the dollar, or \$2,700,000 upon the whole f the little transaction-supposing, of course, that Speyers pays for his purchase. Whether he n do so or not, it is at least consoling to reflect ng harm for the present. Upon the sudden fall f the price of gold he was seen rushing wildly hout Wall street, inviting gentlemen to shoot im upon the spot. E. C. Stedman, the brilliant met of the diamond wedding, celebrated " Israel reyer's Bid "-meaning Speyer's-in a timely pem, published in the New York Daily Tribune on the 28th ult. It is not often that a monetary risis proves in-Speyering to a poet.

Meanwhile Fisk, a principal deus ex machina of this unparalleled pecuniary convulsion, keeps himself barriended in the inmost offices of the Eric Railroad. To have exposed himself upon Broad street or Wall, any time during the past sel, would have been to be torn to pieces by the "Bears"-not figuratively, but in a literal ense, as far at least as regards the tearing. Whether justly or not, Fisk is regarded as being he prime mover in the recent attempt to force p the price of gold; and not all the "Bulls" Broad street could have defended him from the furiated "Bears" whom he had overreached. here, at the very focus of artificial civilization, p Friday or Saturday last, his life would not we been worth a moment's purchase.
