Decline in Prices of Goods.


Since the great sales of cotton and woolen goods in New York the most prominent dry goods dealers have been marking down prices. The reduction began with the down-cottons, which find their principal customers among the middle or laboring class of the population, those in short, who have been obliged to economize their means. It has since extended to great up-town dealers, such as A. T. Stewart & Co., Taylor, Austin, Gode & Co., and others. All of them have put down prices, and under the spirit of competition are acting on the principle of quick sales and small profits. The policy of this leading the way from a date in a more striking manner, incentives to buy is undoubtedly a good one. From a New York paper the annexed statement is given:

The better class of dealers agree that prices promise to remain low. They are convinced that they have reached hard pan, and that they must work therein. Every sign and indication goes to strengthen their conviction. In scores of fashionable shop windows placards are now to be seen, where they never were seen before, announcing the cheapness of the article on exhibition. A pair of hose that a year or two ago would cost \$1 or \$1 25, is now labeled with a card which is printed "50c." or "75c." Undershirts which used to reach from \$1 to \$2 are now on the windows and marked down to 50 cents and \$1. Many shirt makers advertise to make twelve shirts for \$1 at places where two years ago the cheapest they had cost \$2.


All kinds of hosiery have been marked down 12 1/2 per cent., and the price of linen and fine dress goods has also been reduced. A short time ago it was predicted that in consequence of the short crop of raw silk the price of all kinds of manufactured silks would advance. But thus far they have not been affected. In answer to inquiries about the matter, A. T. Stewart & Co., said, "There has been no advance in silks, and they did not know that there would be. The fact is, we had a large and splendid stock of silks, and there would certainly be no change in prices until it was sold out. Arnold, Constable & Co., thought there would be a small advance, but Lord & Taylor did not believe there would be an advance either in silks or dry goods for some time yet to come. Large stocks of silks on hand with no change in prices are reported by other dealers, and all report a general marking down of every variety of dry goods. Woollens, too, are lower than they have been for years. The Sun says that in Baltimore the prices ticketed on goods in the windows indicate similar reductions. Broad-cloths, yard goods, and other articles, which have not yet been reduced. With low prices for all articles of wear and consumption, lower wages will be less sensibly felt by the working class, and having reached hard pan, things will get better.

Foreign Summary.
Young Napoleon has been invited by the Czar to shoot with him this fall.
The rector of Trinity Church, as a memorial of John Jacob Astor, will cost \$150,000.
A St. Petersburg paper asserts that Russia has at present nearly 1,000,000 men under arms and 2,070 field pieces, and that the army can be increased to 2,600,000 men without calling out the reserves.
A Russian brilliant project came to naught. The Bessemer anti-sensitization steamer, built for service between Dover and Calais, having proved a failure has been sold, and will be put up for old iron. She cost nearly a million dollars, and was sold for \$250,000.
Germany and England, being Protestant countries, have thought it their duty to protect the Protestants in Spain from alleged intolerance. Spain has guaranteed religious liberty to all her subjects, but it is said that the government has not executed its promises.
Bismarck's health is better, but he has been obliged to renounce all work and avoid all excitement. He receives neither letters nor telegrams, all pass into the hands of his family or official assistants.
The cotton crop raised at the South this year is the largest since the war, and reaches the encouraging figure of 4,332,228 bales. The largest crop ever produced was that of 1859-60, which was only 482 bales in excess of this year.
A recent discourse Brigham Young said: "For forty-three years I have been more or less engaged preaching to the people. My talking organs are now pretty much exhausted, but my general health is even better than when I was a young man. I never felt better."
The unfinished Washington Monument is now one hundred and seventy-four feet high. It was begun in 1848, more than a quarter of a century ago, and until this spring it stood in the center of an unsightly square of mud, which is now a pleasant park. It has cost, so far, two hundred and thirty thousand dollars.
The hostile savages are covertly creeping back to the agencies to be fed during the winter, so as to be the better prepared for the next summer's campaign. The military authorities in the States of the Indians really engaged in the Sioux war that most of Sitting Bull's warriors are not only likely to escape punishment but to be received with open arms.
The French are greatly exercised over the fact that their numbers are decreasing. The population of France is not as large as it was a few years ago. The elder Napoleon once said, "What France wants is not more territory, but children now." She well. The excess of births over deaths has largely decreased of late.
Some of the leading Methodists of Michigan are much disturbed because dancing is becoming so popular. At State University, where many of their sons and daughters are educated. They do not know exactly what to do about it, but think that the dancing ought, in some way or other, to be stopped. It is very hard now-a-days to make young people stop dancing till they are too tired to stand up.
Economic papers bewail the hard times, and abound in reports of failures, stopping of factories or running on short time, indignation meetings of laborers out of work, disturbances and riots, the growth of a tramping class, and all the indications of poverty, privation and suffering with which the great cities of the United States have only recently become familiar.
The Ann Eliza alimony case continues to excite intense interest in Salt Lake, and the people anxiously wait for the decision which is going to do about the case of the court made on the 21st of July. The order was that Brigham should pay Ann Eliza \$3,000 alimony and \$100 a month pending the suit, within thirty days, or take the case to trial. She has thirty days left, just expired, and Brigham has made no payment yet.
Work was begun in August on the fair to which the city of Paris invites the nations for May 1, 1878. The office is to be composed of the most generally accepted materials of glass and iron, with the exception that the two extremities, or two grand facades, will be constructed in dressed stone, of which it will occupy two hundred and forty square metres, or nearly thirty hectares.
The New York Times says that the improvement in mercantile and commercial affairs, which we have heretofore noticed, shows no abatement whatever, but, on the contrary, is rather increasing and becoming more general each week. The distribution of merchandise to the interior continues on a large scale, and its volume so far this fall is in advance of any previous season since 1873. The active export demand for flour and wheat at steadily advancing prices is one of the latest and most favorable signs of the general situation.
Mr. J. WALTER, proprietor of the London Times, is the latest notable arrival at Philadelphia. Mr. Walter inherited the Times from his father, and it was the son and successor of the John Walter who founded the London Times. And with the newspaper Mr. Walter has inherited the talents and enterprise of his father and grandfather, through whose energy and ability the Times grew to the present it is in Great Britain and in the world. The power John Walter is the inventor or perfecter of the Walter press. He is a journalist of thirty years' experience, a politician of note, and has been named to Philadelphia as one of the most prominent English personages of the time.
A Washington dispatch states that the internal revenue receipts from all sources for the first three months show a decided increase over the corresponding months of last year. Since the country has risen from the slough of despond great activity in many channels of trade may be confidently anticipated. In a few weeks in our history, perhaps none, was there such an abundance of home products of agriculture and manufacture awaiting consumption. The great basis of all enduring trade is the interchange of these commodities; and it is reasonable to expect that the period is near at hand when the traffic in them will assume gigantic proportions.



equal matches with the other team also. One of
the finest performances of the match was that of
Miner, of the Irish team, who on the second day hit
the bull's-eye fifteen successive times at 1,000 yards,
making the highest possible score at that range, and
the highest ever achieved at Creelmoor. Johnson,
of the same team, had done the same thing at 800
yards the day previous. O. Mitchell, of the Scotch
team, with his seventy-three points and fourteen
bull's-eyes, at 1,000 yards, on the first day, received
merited praise, and McVittie made the highest total
score of the day, the match. In fact, each team
has individual records of which it can be proud.
New York, and several other large cities, have
swimming schools for women, which are well patron-
ized. It is a noble and useful institution, and the
education of which many sensibly avail themselves.

this kind, since no facilities for indulging in natatory
exercises are afforded females living in cities.

FLOATING.—Men are drowned by raising their
arms above water, the unbuoyed weight of which
depresses the water, so that the man's buoyancy
is not able to act in a similar manner, and
therefore swim naturally. When a man
falls into deep water he will rise to the surface
and continue there if he does not elevate his
hands. If he moves his hand under water, his
buoyancy will be plucked, his head will rise so high
to give him full liberty to breathe; and if he
will use his legs as in the act of walking,
(or rather walking upstairs) his shoulders will
rise above the water, so that he will be in a
less exertsion with his hands, or apply them to
other purpose. These plain directions are
recommended to the recollection of those who
have not learned to swim in their youth, as
they may be found highly advantageous in some
cases.
The new Sultan of Turkey will be known as
