To the Editor of the Pacific Commercial Advertiser: I noticed in the Gazette of the 14th February the following extract of a letter from the Pacific Mail Steamship Co.: "Should their decision (the Hawaiian Government) be unfavorable to what is just and liberal to this Company, we will immediately and forever drop the port of Honolulu, and carry out our English Colonial Mail contract, running direct from San Francisco to Fiji."

There is no doubt that the people of the islands derive pleasure from the regular and rapid inter-course, which the touching of the steamers at Honolulu, affords them, with Australia, New Zealand and San Francisco, and they would see them both drawn with regret. The travelling public both to and from the British Colonies of the Pacific find it very agreeable to touch at this port, and not unfrequently do some of them stop over to visit our Volcanoes and enjoy the grand scenery of Mountain and Valley afforded by the green Isles. It is also an incidental pecuniary benefit, in the money that is left by travellers by this route, but there are few, if any of our respected residents, who feel that this government would be justified in subsidizing this line of steamers from its very limited revenue. The incidental benefits accruing to the line from the facilities which are furnished by the government without charge, reach all \$20,000 per Annum. Of course if the steamers do not touch here they receive no gratuity, but if the \$100,000 more or less, of freight and passage which they earn by stopping at the green Isles, it is also an incidental pecuniary benefit, in the money that is left by travellers by this route, but there are few, if any of our respected residents, who feel that this government would be justified in subsidizing this line of steamers from its very limited revenue.

The incidental benefits accruing to the line from the facilities which are furnished by the government without charge, reach all \$20,000 per Annum. Of course if the steamers do not touch here they receive no gratuity, but if the \$100,000 more or less, of freight and passage which they earn by stopping at the green Isles, it is also an incidental pecuniary benefit, in the money that is left by travellers by this route, but there are few, if any of our respected residents, who feel that this government would be justified in subsidizing this line of steamers from its very limited revenue.

It has been liberal according to its means, and if the company refuses to bind itself to a reasonable service, let the charge of Justice fall where it belongs, and not upon the government which has dealt liberally throughout.
