The following is an abstract of Messrs Williams, Di mond & Co's Annual Circular, dated Jan 1, 1881. "We present as follows the annual statement of our sugar trade, and its important connection with the Hawaiian

year over the previous one." The circular proceeds to state that but for unforeseen deleys in the deliveries of Hawaiian sugar, the total importation would have reached 3000 tons more. The estimate given of requirements for next year is 50,000 tons, in which case these islands cannot provide the necessary excess over last years supply, unless our production shows an increase of 18,000 tons. After referring to the fluctuations in the sugar markets of the world during the year and the advance which took place in all the great centers of production and distribution towards the close of the year they proceed to say. "But in our advices by the steamer of December 20th, we were obliged to state that the Manila market had not responded to the general improvement. But we now have the pleasure of stating that towards the close of the year the change in values in that market has caused an advance of about a half cent per pound on the 'basis.' After some general reflections on the character of the sugar industry and its prospects, the circular concludes as fol-lows: "The receipts of rice from the islands the past year have reached the high figures of 69,183 bags of 10 lbs each, against 43,395 in 1879, and 42,786 in 1878. Of the receipts of the last year, 28,286 bags arrived during the last quarter. The effect of this large supply was to reduce the price to 5½c, with a large discount for cash, at which about 5,000 bags were taken by a house outside of the grocery trade, and as much more by the grocers. This reduced price will cause some consumption by the well-to-do Chinese, in place of No 1 China, and may increase the overland trade. If the product of the islands is to on increasing at this rate it must be apparent to all concerned that it must find an outlet to some extent besides the consumption of the white poulation of this coast. The receipts of molasses, which have been large the last six mouths, have met with ready sale at price much better than in former years. There are various uses for it, and at the prices now obtained to save it."

WE learn from correspondence per Government of the German Empire. This rumer is said to be based upon the unauthorized discussion of a Hawaiian agent abroad. It is to be regretted that there is any one in a position to thus compromise the country.

LE GLOBE, a Paris journal, in its issue of 30 Nov. last, discusses some recent events in Hawaiian affairs, based, avowedly, on information obtained from Mr. Moreno. Among other matters, an undue interference with the domestic affairs of this country is alleged against the Acting Commissioner of France-that he had threatened the enforcement of his views with ten vessels of war (dix vaisseaux de guerre), and that in consequence of his interference, France had lost the opportunity of educating two Hawaiian youths, who had been sent to the military and naval schools of Germany. The Roman-Neapolitan journal La Staffetta, in its issue of 15th Dec., last, copies the article of Le Globe, and, in its editorial comments, is led by the same inspiration to condemn certain action (far pronunciamenti) of Consul Schaefer, as hostile to Italian interests. Now, inasmuch as Consul Schaefer was absent from the Capital for three weeks on Hawaii, during all of the period referred to, the statement of his interference is a mere invention; and as regards the Acting French Commissioner, we feel that these publications abroad, based upon information furnished by a Hawaiian agent, offer a proper occasion to the party misrepresented, to claim diplomatic privilege and protection.

One old resident writing from Kona, Hawaii, says that they have not had such a blow for the last 12 years : the storm of wind and rain that prevailed throughout South Kons was somewhat alarming, yet has proven eminently beneficent; as all the springs and streams, that were a little while ago dried up, are

everywhere overflowing. Another writing from Lanai, says that the swell was so great, owing to prevailing strong Southerly winds, that the charging surf overtopped long lines of bluff over forty feet high, and the surmounting spray was hurled far inland by the fury of the storm, At such times great quantities of rare shells, not commonly seen on our shores, are now to be found ; and we hear of rare specimeus of conchs and nauthe Honorable Mrs. Pauabi B. Bishop, escorted tilus found, said to belong only to certain Line

Col. James G. Fair whose visit here will be remembered by all who had the good fortune to make a very pleasant acquaintance by their introduction to him, has been elected United States Senator for the State of Nevada, in which capacity he succeeds the Hon. Wm. Sharon. Those who know him will be glad to hear that this enterprising but unostentatious millionaire, has secured one of the laurels he coveted. Col. Fair is an Irishman by birth, and emigrated with his parents to the States in 1843, when he was twelve years old. His great fortune was made in company with Flood, O'Brien and Mackey since the year 1867; but he was known long before that date as the leading mining and mechanical eugineer in the great silver State. He carries with him to the Senate the good wishes of his friends in Honolulu.

According to the Fiji Times, prison discipline in Fiji is primitive in its way. Eliasa, a prisoner under sentence for twelve months at Draibs, found ample time to go up town and commit three largenies within a fortnight, for which he is now doing three sentences of three months each in Totoga. This reminds one of the New Zealand gaoler in the primitive times of that colony, who promised his prisoners (mostly runaway sailors) that if they behaved well he would take them to the races-and kept his word. But it requires Polynesian insouciance to provide for a permanent residence in gaol for a man, by allowing him to commit one crime, while he is serving Jason Perry, of Portugal; J. F. FOREIGN NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN.

The Queen's speech on opening Parliament on the 6th inst. was more lengthy than these State documents usually are. It refers to the Greek frontier question as under negotiation, to the insurrection in Transvaal as a thing to be promptly put down, and to the war in Basuto land as if it affected the colonists only, and were no Imperial concern. The longest paragraph is of course devoted to Ireland, but gives little information beyond what we have already published as to the intention of the Government in respect of alterations of the Land laws and coercive measures. It indicates no yielding to the demand for Home Rule, and refers to the Land Law of 1870 as containing the principles to be still further developed. The following remarks on it are founded on the " authoritative information" forwarded to leading American papers by their London correspondents. "It now comes out that the Tory tendency of the Queen's speech is the result of her own personal convictions, and not of any influence brought to bear upon her by Lord Beaconsfield. Indeed Victoria has on several occasions shown that on certain subjects she can be as obstinate and opinionated as the most stubborn of her ancestors. The report is that she positively refused to accept the draft of the address as originally drawn up for her by Gladstone. This may be a mere rumor; but if true, such a course on her part would not be out of charac.er. The internal condition of Ireland is not worse

than it was, but murders and other outrages occur almost daily and the authority of the Land League increases continually. The state trials are proceeding slowly, and would probably last a month longer. Meanwhile those of the accused who are members of Parliament appear to be in their places there, and have announced the intention of the Irish party to repeat the obstructive course adopted last session if any bill be brought in to give extraordinary powers of co ercion to the

The winter has been severe, and much driftce was on the Thames, a circumstance which caused the postponement of the Hanlan-Laycock rowing match.

UNITED STATES. The full text of the new treaty with China has been published. Its provisions do not differ from the summary previously given of them, except that the clause about opium is much more stringent than could have been expected, being an absolute prohibition of the trade in that drug on the part of Americans in China and of the Chinese

General Grant has been lecturing on the Nicaragua canal scheme, which is viewed with favor in the States, except where the tyranny of the great trans-continental railroad monopolies

CHILE AND PERU.

News from Panama to 4th January, reports three Chilean divisions as advancing on Lima through Peruvian soil. The Chileans lost two steam launches in recent attacks on Callao and their great Armstrong gun and a 200 ton turret

TURKNY AND GREECE. The N. Y. World's cable special from London. dated January 16th, says: I have been told by well-informed persons to-night that the British Ministry now regard war between Greece and Turkey as inevitable, and fear that sooner or later it will involve all Europe. The Parte, it is announced, has communicated to the Embassadors a fresh note, regretting the warlike preparations of Greece, which are bringing trouble and uncertainty upon the peace of Europe. In order to terminate such a state of affairs, which the Porte says is disastrous to both Turkey and Greece, the Powers are invited to send instructions to their Embassadors at Constantinople for a European Conference. The Porte hopes a pacific solution will thus be obtained. The note has created a remove from this city the filth that is everywhere good impression. The Greek Government, meanwhile, is negociating for the purchase of swift unarmored criusers.

THE TRANS-VAAL. The Boer Triumvirate have issued a proclamation defending their action and offering pardon to all opponents. They agree to retain the present officials, to admit a British Consul and to indemnify Great Britian for her expenditure on behalf of the Trans-vaal. The Triumvirate have proclaimed martial law. Governor Bellairs, at Patchefstroom, is closely beseiged. His position causes great apprehension here. Colonel Lanyon, the British Administrator for the Transvaal, is still at Pretoria. He has been summoned to surrender. The excitement throughout Cape Colony is intense. Communication with the Transvaal, except through the Orange Free State, is entirely
