

FOREIGN CORRESPONDENCE.

San Francisco, January 14, 1884. The New Year entered into this city a pestilent gang of reformed Irish agitators, usually lumped together in every day parlance as "dynamiters," and chiefly employing themselves in making night hideous with the daily press characterized as "impassioned" speeches against England and her policy, and setting forth the already too well-known wrong and wrong of the "Irish question."

The "Parnell Tribune" is complete, having reached 237,000, and most of it has been collected in Ireland for all the vehement foreign proselytizing and soliciting that have scandalized good people of these United States. It would be difficult to decide toward what all this very genuine and unshodding upheaval in Ireland is tending. It is no demagogue who is at the helm. Parnell is a passive and languid, lives in London, keeps aloof, as it seems, from the passing interests of Ireland, and yet retains his hold upon the Irish people. At the banquet given in Dublin, last month to celebrate the completion of the "Parnell Tri-ute," he made a speech in the course of which he did not directly utter a word of thanks for the fund just presented to him, and yet no Irish leader was ever more generally loved and trusted. His great hold on the people is that he has got together thoroughly bold and honest men, and he has managed it. He is supposed to be acting from some profound motive, perhaps unknown to all but himself, and for which he is not to be asked to account at present. If nothing is done this is not an attitude that even the handsome and frozen Parnell can keep up for a lifetime, and if he really has no definite plan of action, he is a distracted and a country, he might be called to a sudden reckoning some day that he might not find so pleasant as posing at a banquet. One palpable result he has accomplished: He has won over Mr. Gray, M. P., editor of the Freeman's Journal—a paper which at first was by no means entirely favorable to the Land League.

England's Egyptian tactics go steadily on toward turning the land of the Sphinx into a British dependency. The False Prophet has been cutting a picturesquely threatening figure on the horizon for a year now, and beyond graduating to be called El Mahdi, has not made things so warm as he has been expected to do. The distance into Egypt is so great from London that even the hope of plunder, the great incentive for Arab processes, would tempt the Oriental army to leave the desert. Of course, when England gets ready, she will fall upon the rebels in the Soudan, and crush them with disciplined troops, and lay out everything as tranquility as matters were reported in the celebrated dispatch some weeks since. The hope of the sending ships to sea—300,000 tons, yet the Khedive feels the tolls tightening around him, and gives vent to his feelings in kicking vigorously at the suspected design of England to compel him to abdicate, which his bold announcement that he will surrender only to force, makes all the more likely to occur when England finds the times ripe for his deposition. The lower classes in England are striking, not to be outdone by our cloth factories in Pennsylvania.

The murder of Colonel Sedukhin, of the Russian Gendarmier, under such atrocious circumstances, has put the hope of plunder, the great incentive for Arab processes, would tempt the Oriental army to leave the desert. Of course, when England gets ready, she will fall upon the rebels in the Soudan, and crush them with disciplined troops, and lay out everything as tranquility as matters were reported in the celebrated dispatch some weeks since. The hope of the sending ships to sea—300,000 tons, yet the Khedive feels the tolls tightening around him, and gives vent to his feelings in kicking vigorously at the suspected design of England to compel him to abdicate, which his bold announcement that he will surrender only to force, makes all the more likely to occur when England finds the times ripe for his deposition. The lower classes in England are striking, not to be outdone by our cloth factories in Pennsylvania.

France has prohibited the importation of American salted meats except at Marseilles, Havre and Bordeaux, while after January 29, 1884, all importations of hog meats are prohibited. In America, the fall of Villard, the Northern Pacific railway manager was a nine days subject of conversation. His dethronement was not absolutely unforeseen, and it involved his private fortune. The Northern Pacific Directory voted him \$10,000 a year for the entire period in which he served as President of the company, and there he is. Villard wrestled with the gods of financial diplomacy and he was stronger. The San Francisco Wasp had him as Phaton hurled from the misguided chariot of the Sun by a thunderbolt from Jupiter's hand, Jupiter being Jay Gould, cloud-enraptured. But Villard brought order out of confusion when he first took hold of the affairs of the Northern Pacific and carried the third trans-continental railway to completion, and the work is not to be succeeded at. To keep a road going after building it is quite another affair.

Congress goes on sitting and bills and resolutions pour in galore. The Mormon cloud thickens and the Saints are extremely obstinate and not at all likely to give up their fat acres and lean wives without a struggle. They did not start their flourishing commonwealth with any tacit acknowledgment that they were living in mortal sin and it is going to take more than a tract and a pulpit denunciation, and an order from the White House, to make them mend their ways now. Also to dispense and generally maltreat the peaceable dwellers in smiling farms, just because they dwell in their own way, and a law to themselves, seems harsh treatment for an inefficient cause, but discipline has got to be maintained, in the language of "Mr. Bagnett," and if the Mormons wax too arrogant in their small Kingdom within the Republic, they must be made to see the error of their ways.

Our "more than earthly" sunsets continue to wrap us in a lurid glow long after the darkness has fallen upon us, and another heavy theory has been advanced that the earth has a little satellite hitherto unknown and unrecognized which revolves within the shadow of the earth so that the sun's rays never reach it, and consequently it is a block of ice like the moon. It is now nearer than it has ever been to the edge of the shadow, from which it will never be lifted any more than the soul of the hero of the Iliad, and catches and refracts the sun's rays. The satellite theory also accounts for a great many deviations in astronomical calculations which have hitherto been put down under the head of unknown attraction, but as it is supposed no telescope of this world will ever see the little frozen satellite, the light thrown upon the sunset subject is not particularly dazzling.

Judge Sawyer's perpetual injunction in the Debris Case has caused first, a sensation of profound relief that the long struggle between the swamped farmers and mud-dispersing hydraulicists has been definitively decided, at least for a time, by an authoritative court, and next ex-

sively long faces in mining circles. The cheerful and disinterested express themselves as perfectly confident that, considering the incentive, a new process will be ultimately discovered for releasing the gold from the heights above Sacramento, without damage to the valley residents' property. Considering the inducement there is every probability that the case will be appealed and taken up to the United States Supreme Court, indeed the half dozen capitalists directly interested in the North Bloomfield Mine are taking active steps to have it carried up, but unless they succeed in having the case advanced on the calendar, it will be two years before it can be heard at Washington, the cases there being twenty-four months behind, more's the pity.

The Huntington letters continue a reigning sensation. Nobody can quite get over them. The circumstances partake of the sublime in their stupendousness. Huntington's own unspicably cold-blooded corruption, Mrs. Colton's unquenchable spirit in bringing them forward and the Chronicle's unflinching account in printing them are all on the high level of daring deeds. Of course for serious results, the publication of the letters causes more sensation at the East than here, for the focus that radiates the crime is there. The exposure of unscrupulous methods will probably lead to a Congressional investigation, when developments in a Credit Mobilier may be looked for.

The gentle ripple of interest in the World's Fair project slowly widens in the community and may become a current with proper breezes. The San Franciscan is such an indifferent person that it takes a superhuman clamor to wake him up at all, but when that is finally accomplished he has been known to work like a beaver, and the World's Fair will probably be a credit to California as soon as the San Franciscan has waked up and had his little laugh at the idea of such a preposterous occurrence, which is the little overture that always has to be gone through with before anything serious can be begun.

One of the pleasant social events in December was the marriage of Clarence Macfarlane and Miss Lillian Lesher. The ceremony was performed by Dr. Githens, one of our ministers who is most graceful on such occasions, at the Episcopal Church of the Advent. After the wedding there was a pleasant reception at the Palace Hotel, where all the city and the Island friends of the popular young couple assembled to congratulate them and to spend a charming evening.

JOTTINGS FROM FOREIGN PAPERS.

All the sensations of the late San Francisco Harbor regime have not been worked out yet. Mr. Thos. Quirk is still to pose before the public. Quirk has left Honolulu for Portland, Oregon. It now transpires that his errand is not of a peaceful nature. Before Quirk faded from this scene he became insanely jealous of his wife, by reason of an idea that the mate of a Honolulu bark was too marked in his attentions to her. On one occasion Quirk emptied his pistol at this gentleman, but his aim was bad and nothing came of the affair. A gentleman who has just arrived from the Islands, says that in some way Quirk heard that his wife had gone to Portland, where the much-shot-at mate is now residing. Quirk immediately made up his mind that his wife had gone to meet the man of whom he was jealous, and was so foolish before he started for Portland as to announce his intention of sinking a lead mine into the mate's body. It is not improbable that, when Mr. Quirk arrives at Portland he will find a requisition from the Governor of the State of California, on a few charges of embezzlement of State funds. If it should chance that he was brought back, and made to stand a trial, some fresh revelations about harbor affairs might be made public, for Quirk always boasted that he knew a great deal, and as Gray and O'Brien are in a position to help him out of his scrape, he is liable to carry out his often expressed threat and "squelch."

A wrestling match between Edwin Bibby and Matsuda Sorakichi, the Japanese champion, \$500 a side, took place in New York on 14th January, and was won by Bibby in two rounds. The Japanese was quite overmatched by Bibby. The first bout lasted thirty-nine seconds, when Bibby was on top of him and had three points, two shoulders and a hip down, the Jap forced the work, and it was quite evident it was not to be a lippodrome. Bibby had a decided advantage in the long hair of the unsuspecting Oriental, and in the first bout entangled his hand in it and made Matsuda wince. This is not allowed in the far East and was new to the Nagasaki champion. He was otherwise so roughly handled that he bled at the mouth. He was game to the toes, however. In the second bout, which lasted three minutes, he gave Bibby all he could do to get him down. Bibby succeeded, and won the match in two straight falls.

The Herald says: The Japanese is a good man, and with training and instructions in the style of wrestling, he may give Bibby trouble. He was as ignorant of what he had to face as a baby. War between France and China is thought inevitable by Chinese officials. A later telegram states that it is reported that the members of the imperial family of China have offered a portion of their private fortunes to assist in the war against France. The White Star line S. S. Celtic broke her shaft on a recent passage from New York to Liverpool. The steamer Argosy, from New York for London reports having spoken the steamer Celtic and taken off several of her passengers and transferred them to a tug bound for Falmouth. The Argosy spoke the Celtic in latitude 45 degrees 58 minutes north, 37 degrees 12 minutes west. The four passengers landed at Falmouth express much satisfaction at getting ashore, the voyage having been so monotonous. They state the Celtic sails slow, but behaves well under canvas. She was finally picked up by the S. S. Britannic of the same line and towed safely to Liverpool.

A balke-line billiard contest of 3,000 points, 600 points a night, between Vignaux and Jacob Schaefer, began at the cafe of the Grand Hotel, Paris, on the 14th instant. There was a large attendance. The score at the close of the night's play was: Vignaux, 690; Schaefer, 518. Vignaux's principal runs were 107, 106, 93; Schaefer's 124, 105, 90.

Another iron-clad for the Chinese Navy was launched at Kiel on the 11th instant. The Berliner Post, referring to the transfer of Court Herbert Von Bismarck from the German Embassy at London to that at St. Petersburg, says: The transfer is convincing evidence of the good relations between Germany and Russia and a gratifying augury of the undisturbance and continued friendship between the two countries.

The Temps, discussing Henry George's lectures, says: It is already evident that Mr. George must renounce the hope of exercising any serious influence on the educated minds of England.

Men continue to arrive at Panama by every vessel for the canal company. The number now employed exceeds 14,000. The dry season has set in and it is hoped that much progress will be made this year in the work.

Spain has taken off the extraordinary duty upon goods entering Cuba from America. All importations of hog meats into France will be absolutely prohibited after January 20, 1884.

French newspapers advocate the seizure of the islands of Chusan and Formosa, as well as of Hainan.

Lord Granville has renewed his representations to Mr. Ferry in regard to the destruction of British trading posts in Madagascar.

The Pope will hold a Consistory in April.

It is proposed to disfranchise the disloyal Irish constituencies.

Sarah Bernhardt is about to publish a book entitled "Marie Colombe."

The London Times says it has the best authority for stating that China will conditionally make important concessions to France.

General Dominguez says that recent events in Spain have utterly destroyed the chances for a republic.

Several very heavy commercial failures have occurred in England.

Mr. Ferry proposes to abolish the office of life Senator and restore the *senatus de lege*.

Samuel C. Bledgett, lately dismissed from the treasurership of the Providence (R. I.) Institution for Savings, proves a defaulter to the extent of \$27,130 65.

The immigrants that arrived in the United States during 1883, numbered 455,647, 197 more than in 1882.

Mr. Pierre Lorillard has filed a libel against the Pennsylvania Railroad Company's ferryboat which ran into his yacht Radin. The damages are laid at about \$24,000.

In the whole Russian empire of nearly 100,000,000 persons there are only 776 journals and periodicals of all kinds.
