

ants, who were the persons found in the room, and they were merely lookers on in Vienna. The Interpreter further explained that some of the paraphernalia which was exhibited in the Court, might be for fun or might be for gambling. He did not know. (?) Counsel for the defendants claimed their discharge principally upon two grounds, first: that it was not shown that his clients were vagrants under a fair interpretation of the law, and second: the evidence upon which the Court depended to convict them as vagrants, totally failed. The Crown not showing that the defendants were gamblers or that they supported themselves for the most part by gaming. In conclusion the Counsel for the defence said that his last duty for his clients was that they be discharged.

Mr. Dayton, for the Crown followed, and said he had listened with great profit to the argument of the Counsel for the defence and admitted as he—the Counsel for the defence—had expressed, that the charge brought in this case was experimental and in fact a new departure, but that nevertheless, it was as well known to him as it was to the Counsel for the defence, that oftentimes large numbers of persons congregated at particular places for illegal purposes, and who are without visible means of support, and the law, as it stands, ought to reach them. He further said that he would be quite satisfied that a very small punishment be inflicted upon these defendants if His Honor concluded to accept the Crown's theory of the case.

His Honor was pleased to say that the subject was one of public importance, affecting directly divers interests and promised to enter into a full examination of the subject and would be prepared to render his decision on Monday morning next (to-day) at 9 o'clock, and to which time the defendants can go at large.

Paakani was brought up on a remand, also charged with vagrancy. Bolobela gave evidence supporting the defendant's statement that he has property and the means of subsistence. A *not. pros.* was then entered.

Three drunkards forfeited bail. John Peka, charged with assault and battery was found not guilty and discharged. In the vagrant case previously reported, judgment was rendered as follows:

His Honor said the defendants were charged generally under the whole chap. 37 of Penal Code. The first thing to be considered was whether such a game as was described in evidence could be considered gaming under our statutes. He held it could. He also referred to the law in California where parties found in possession of Chinese lottery tickets or where such lotteries are held. He hoped that the next Legislature would provide a law to meet directly the Chinese lottery houses which are becoming very general in Honolulu. Such houses are inducements to employees to commit petty thefts in order to obtain means whereby they may engage in these lotteries, and they were demoralizing generally. Seven of the defendants being found in the room where it was beyond question that a lottery of the kind was being carried on, judging from the paraphernalia, tickets, etc., that were found on the premises, the question was whether they came within the meaning of the chapter under which they were charged. If tickets of the lottery had been found in their possession or they had been found entirely engaged in the work of the lottery it might be safely said that they were partially getting their support from gaming or were neglecting their calling or employment. Or if they were found there on more than one occasion, it might be said they came within the meaning of the statute. But it does not appear that these men had any tickets in their possession or were actively engaged at the time of the arrest, or that they had ever been charged before with gaming. He did not find that they could be held under the statute as charged. They are discharged. The two first named defendants Ah Ing and Ah Fat seem to have been the keepers of the establishments; that all the paraphernalia, tickets, etc., were found in their possession, they presiding at the table where the lottery was conducted, there being no evidence offered to rebut that. Consequently he found them guilty as charged. His Honor lectured them all on the subject of gaming, and warned them that if they were again found under similar circumstances they would be liable to a conviction under the statute under which they have now been charged. Ah Ing and Ah Fat were found guilty and sentenced to 10 days imprisonment at hard labor. The other seven were discharged. Ah Hong, on a charge of perjury was committed for trial. Sophie du Commun was charged with attempting to destroy writings contrary to Section 12, Chap. 30 of the Penal Code which reads as follows: The cancelling, destroying, secreting or obliterating a writing, being one's own or that of another, in which any other person has any property or direct interest with intent thereby to defraud any person, or prejudice any one in his person, property, rights or interest and whereby any person might be defrauded or so prejudiced, shall be subject to the penalty of forgery of the like writing; for example, fraudulently destroying a writing previously executed and delivered by the party destroying the same or de-

stroying a writing by tearing off or abstracting a part thereof."

Mr. Russell appeared for the defence, and at his request a remand was granted until the 14th instant.

CIVIL CASES.

Two charges of deserting contract services. In one case it was the 3d offence and as a corrective a fine of \$5 was inflicted. The other was remanded until the 11th instant.

Ah Yuen vs. Ah Hong. Assumpsit for \$80 75. Mr. Cecil Brown for plaintiff, Mr. W. R. Castle for defendant. The claim of the plaintiff was on account of wages. No defence offered. Judgment for plaintiff for \$80 75. Costs \$3 35. Appeal to Intermediary Court.

Awana vs. Akini. Action on promissory note of \$40. No defence offered. Judgment for plaintiff for \$40. Attorney's commission \$4. Costs \$4 20.

Four cases continued until the 13th instant, one case discontinued and one settled out of Court.
