 —Last Tuesday was St. Patrick's day.  
 —"Jack" Downing, Hays, called Tuesday.  
 —See Dr. Scott's new advertisement. Isn't it a clipper?  
 —Sheriff Baker is fencing a quarter section of his Big creek valley land.  
 —Well, this has been a rather cold week, with a north wind the most of the time.  
 —A. H. Blair moved down the railroad Thursday morning, and back home in the evening.  
 —Osborn & Monroe have purchased of Col. Fellows the Grammar School building and lot.  
 —Lee Monroe took a run down to Kansas City on Monday, and has been gone all the week.  
 —Rev. Mr. Stayt will begin his preaching at this place to-morrow, (Sunday.) He will preach at 11 o'clock a. m. and in the evening.  
 —Mr. J. C. Wilson, of the southern part of Graham county, was a caller on Monday. He reports that a good many strangers are now moving into that region.
