Let the reader pause a few moments and examine the facts and figures. Figures won't lie, if Democrats do. The writer has been much troubled and has devoted much time to gaining a few facts bearing upon this "friendship" of the Democratic party and desires to present the records for examination.

Reports from twenty-one counties, which is a fifth of the counties of the state, are herewith presented as follows: Clay county—This is one of the exceptions. At Clay Center, the principal town in the county, a union soldier was removed and a union soldier appointed postmaster.

Decatur county—This county has fared well at the hands of the present administration, and there have been no removals. Doniphan county—The postoffices of Doniphan county are all filled by civilian Democrats. Mr. Leland, the postmaster at Troy, was an old soldier, and is succeeded by a civilian Democrat.

Elk county—Mrs. Sue A. Truby, the widow of an old Union soldier, was removed from the postoffice at Elk Falls to give place to a Kentucky Democrat named George Fain. It is not known whether Fain was in the rebel army or not, but from report he is probably too much of a coward to have been in any army that had fighting for its object.

Graham county—The Democrats are removing every old soldier—even the little postmasters. At Millbrook C. Fountain, an ex-Union soldier, was removed from the postoffice, and was succeeded by W. Anderson, a civilian Democrat. Z. T. Fletcher, postmaster at Nicodemus, an ex-Union soldier, was removed and A. N. Harper, a civilian Democrat, was appointed. At Hill City Mrs. F. J. Garrett, an old soldier's widow, was removed from the postoffice and Kate Lane, a civilian Democrat's daughter, was appointed.

How does the old soldier of Kansas like his new "friends"? Your correspondent regrets exceedingly that he is unable at this time to give reports from all the counties of the state, but the above and foregoing will probably be sufficient for one dose. It will be followed up by reports from the other counties as soon as they can be received at the Herald's Topeka headquarters.
