Publicity Required.

The law says: "This in addition to the other duties prescribed by law, every township treasurer shall publish in some newspaper published in the township or in the county having general circulation therein, immediately following the annual statement in October of each year a full and detailed statement, duly verified of receipts, expenditures and indebtedness of the township for the year ending at the time of the said annual settlement."
"Also: "The city council shall cause to be published in a newspaper between the fifteenth and twentieth days of March, June, September and December of each year a full and detailed statement of receipts and expenditures for the quarter ending on the fifteenth of the month named."

One of the worst hail and wind storms passed through this part of the country since the Indians left. Mr. Littlechild's crops were ruined and his cattle beaten up and scattered all over the country. J. Finch lost 4 cows by lightning and 20 hogs drowned besides all his crops were destroyed. Gleason Bros. lost about 70 acres of wheat, they have 60 acres left. Faank Ivan had 100 acres of wheat, total loss; no insurance. F. Schwanbeck Sr. lost 400 acres of small grain, it was fine, total loss; no insurance. Gilbert Crocker lost 200 acres of small grain, total loss; insurance \$750. Adolph Schwanbeck lost 250 acres of small grain, total loss; insurance \$500. Fred and Otto Schwanbeck had 300 acres of small grain, loss about 75 per cent; insurance \$750. R. Owens had 300 acres of wheat, loss about 75 per cent; insurance \$1,000. Searl Krhut had 200 acres of small grain, total loss; insurance \$270. Aug. Tegtmeyer had 330 acres small grain; total loss; no insurance. Henry Wish had 200 acres of small grain, total loss; insurance \$170. Otto Wolf had 150 acres small grain, total loss; no insurance; the wind blew his implement shed down and did other damage. Ernest Hillman lost his entire crop 150 acres; \$500 insurance. Mr. Cummings lost 50 acres of small grain; no insurance. Mr. Cullum lost 50 acres of wheat; no insurance. Charley Spena lost 95 per cent of 120 acres of wheat, and the wind turned his his house and barn inside out; insurance \$500. Kristoff brothers had the southwest part of their wheat insured and to accommodate the insurance company the hail knocked the whey out of the northeast corner; loss about 40 acres. F. Krhut lost a small per cent; insurance \$500; the wind picked up a couple of his buildings and dropped them in his pasture.
