### Obituary.

Captain Lewis Jones was born in Brockville, York county, Canada, September 8, 1833, and died April 12, 1908, at 5 a. m. at the home of John H. Clark, his son-in-law, 18 miles northeast of Wa-Keeney. Death came to him after much suffering, although pneumonia was the immediate cause. Only a few years ago the writer was told by the captain himself how he had been troubled regularly since the war of the Rebellion with headache, due to a bullet wound on the head.

Faithfulness had stamped the service that this man gave upon the field of battle to his country. For five long years he met the test. First it was with the infantry, while latterly he took his part with the 4th Wisconsin cavalry. And "war is hell" is their plain statement. Now another of the survivors has fallen.

Still war in this case has not been left without a sacrament of hope. A home was started. As the battlefield is soon grown over with green and we are relieved of its awful sight, so with life. The captain was joined in marriage October 15, 1868, at Jefferson, Wis., to Miss Susan J. Es-selstyes. She has gone before, but to this union three children were born, one son and two daughters survive him.

The funeral was held Monday of this week. After a brief home service, J. C. Everett, of the Wa-Keeney Presbyterian church, had charge of the church service, beginning at 2 p. m. The G. A. R. Post officiated at the grave.

Again the entire community joins in another sad bereavement.
