Obituary.

On December 2, 1908, Grand-  
ma Sommerville, as she was best  
known to her friends, passed  
away at her home after several  
years of invalidism.

She was born in New Hartford,  
Otsego county, New York, June  
19, 1853. On December 31, 1843,  
she was united in marriage to  
Peter Lahman. To this union  
three sons were born, none of  
whom survive. Mrs. Lahman  
was left a widow and married  
William Sommerville at Oskalo-  
osa, Iowa, September 20, 1861.  
In the spring of 1882 they came  
to western Kansas and have  
since resided here. Several  
years ago they purchased a home  
in Wa-Keeney and have ever been  
among the best esteemed fam-  
ilies of the community.

Grandma Sommerville was be-  
lieved by all who knew her. She  
was always cheerful under her  
afflictions and a sunshine and  
warmth radiated from her life  
that made it a pleasure to come  
in contact with her. She was a  
consistent, earnest christian and  
died in full assurance of her  
faith. She was a kind neighbor,  
a good friend and a loving wife  
and mother. She leaves a hus-  
band and several grand children  
to mourn her loss.

On Friday, December 4th, the  
funeral was held at the Presby-  
terian church, conducted by Rev.  
J. C. Everett assisted by the  
Eastern Star. Interment was  
made in the Wa-Keeney ceme-

On December 2d Willis Law  
died at Roswell, New Mexico,  
after many month's illness.

He was born in Graham coun-  
ty December 14, 1886, and has  
spent most of his life there. He  
came to this place to attend  
High School and while here won  
a place in the hearts of the peo-  
ple by his kindly disposition and  
high christian character, and  
the students and teachers of the  
school felt his death keenly.

He had been in failing health

family cemetery lot, and almost  
a hundred conveyances followed  
the remains to its last resting  
place.
