Charles W. Sweet

Charles W. Sweet was born in West Troy, New York, October 11, 1837, and died April 4, 1909, aged 71 years, 5 months and 23 days. In 1859 he moved to Michigan and on September 16, 1860, was married to Charlotte E. Roberts. To this union nine children were born; all of whom are living. Mr. Sweet was a veteran of the Civil war, having joined the Fifth Michigan Cavalry of Volunteers in the beginning of the war, and at the close was mustered out at Leavenworth, Kansas. In 1880 he came to Kansas, where he remained until the time of his death. His motto through life was, "keep a stiff upper lip, and through its various vicissitudes always lived up to it and made his fight manfully and nobly. He was a devoted husband and father and kind neighbor and an excellent citizen. In his passing Trego county loses one of her truly good men. On Wednesday afternoon, April 7, the funeral services were held at the M. E. church, the sermon being delivered by Rev. See of Banner, the G. A. R. assisting. All the family, which consists of Mrs. Louisa Snelling, Wa-Keeney, Kans., Mrs. Carrie S. Piersee, Miltonvale, Kans., Geo. B. Sweet, Southard, Texas, Emma L. Reported For Muster

Commander and Comrades of Trego Post.—Your committee to whom was assigned the public announcement of the death of Comrade C. W. Sweet begs leave to submit the following:

While overwhelmed with grief, Captain Trego Post humbly submits to the will and pleasure of the Supreme Commander of the Universe in sounding the last roll call for Comrade C. W. Sweet to report on the shores from whence no traveler returns and to join the innumerable company of those who muster upon the parade ground of Heaven.

Comrade Sweet's departure occurred on April 4, 1909. Funeral services were held at the M. E. church in this city April 7th, Rev. See jr., officiating. After service Captain Trego Post took charge of the remains and escorted the procession to the Wa-Keeney cemetery where all that was mortal of Comrade Sweet was tenderly laid to rest, in keeping with the Grand Army ritual.

In the death of Comrade Sweet Captain Trego Post has lost one of its most honored, beloved and efficient members, he being, at the time of his demise, Quarter Master of the Post. He is survived by a wife and a number of grown children, all of whom are grief-stricken over the loss of a true and faithful husband and indulgent parent. Captain Trego Post tender their earnest and sincere condolences to the family of the deceased in their great bereavement.

There is no one who dies whose death is not momentous, if we but behold it as God's angels do. And yet when men have filled the household with their presence and society has been made a beneficiary by their kindness and by their wisdom, death becomes still more momentous, leaving behind them sorrow and tears and many reverent thoughts. Yet of all who have passed through on their way to their long home no one has gone, or for a long time will go, bearing with him so many sympathies, so much of kindness, so many tender recollections, and so much that should be instructive as did our Comrade Sweet.

At last, at last, he rests as one who has been driven through a long voyage by storms that would not abate. He reaches the shore and sees the beaming sun and is at rest. O, how sweet the way that leads to the grave when that grave is God's golden gate to immortality! How blest are

the dead that die in the Lord! God grant that in the solemnity of these thoughts, it may be ours so to live that when we die angels shall open the gates and receive us unto the joy and glory of our Lord.

It was ordered by the Post that headquarters be draped in mourning for sixty days, that a copy of the foregoing be transmitted to the family of the deceased, spread on the records of the Post and published in the local papers of this city.
