Work on the Tawney & Smith store was delayed this week on account of bad weather.


T. P. Bush the sandy-haired barber, has been doing a rushing business since he opened up.

It is a wonder kidnapers in Kansas are not given such a frightful punishment as being compelled to write the word "kidnap" twenty times.—Atchison Globe.
