Look Here!

EDITOR OF KANSAS PATRIOT:—The advocates of "Manhood Suffrage" are trying to turn the world upside down...

At a meeting of German citizens in Lawrence a few days ago, in which one J. Assmus (what a pity it is that all of our anti-meetings cannot have such a dignified name to preside over them—how appropriate!) was elected President. It was:

"Resolved, That a mass meeting be held in Turner's Hall, by the German citizens of Douglas county, on Saturday, the 14th inst., for the purpose of electing delegates to the convention to be held at Topeka, on the 23d of September, for the purpose of a consolidation against female suffrage, Sunday and temperance laws."

Every body thinks of it. How very appropriately have these men classed female suffrage with Sunday and temperance laws. The Germans are philophrates. They understand the laws of affinity. Why do the Germans oppose female suffrage? Because our Christian women are in favor of, and would forever vote to maintain the sanctity of the Christian Sabbath.

Now, in engraving this proposition into the fundamental law of the State, we should do that which we in our judgment think will conduce to the welfare and prosperity of the State, and to the best interests and happiness of those who are to be affected by it.

But I have a doubt, should this question be made part of the fundamental law of the land, that it will be attained at the expense of the domestic circle. I think I see discord creeping in, "seeking whom it may devour," for would there be a division of sentiment?

My friend Blank, after enumerating all the privileges women enjoy, sees no ground of inconsistency in allowing them to vote; and thinks that if she has the capacity to engage in all other things, she has the capacity to vote. I allow her all the capacity; see no ground of inconsistency, because she can engage in business or do any other thing. It is on the ground of expediency that I oppose it.

Let me say Mr. Vaughan is not writing on the question of the hour; he is looking at the matter as a politician. A German paper commenting on the above says: "That's what the matter."

You "oppose Free Lovers," and they have no power as a class; so do I. But these Germans wield a fearful power, and it is augmenting every day. And this power, whatever it may be, will always be turned against the good morals of society. There is no mistake in this. Women, as a class, have always been in favor of religion and good morals. In fact we do not trust them to vote on the great moral questions of the day? Let facts and common sense have fair play here.

And I beseech every man, before he votes, to lay aside prejudice, and consider what he may do. Look out upon our surroundings, and think of the results that may follow the vote for or against female suffrage. Think of the probabilities of wresting a power from the hands of those who do favor the right, and would no doubt always wield it for good, and turning it over into the hands of those whose expressed determination it is to oppose, by their influence and votes, the best safeguards of our public morals. Let no man who loves the good and true, vote on the wrong side of this great moral question. C. R. RICE.

RESOLUTIONS. HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 43, PROPOSING AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION. Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Kansas, the Senate concurring: That the proposition to strike the word "male" from Section One, of Article Five, of the Constitution of the State, is hereby submitted to the electors of the State, for ratification or rejection, in compliance with Section One, Article Fourteen, of the Constitution. That each elector shall be entitled to vote a written or printed ballot, at the first general election, for striking the word "male" from Section One, of Article Five of the Constitution, or "Against striking the word 'male' from Section One of Article Five of the Constitution."

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That said election shall be conducted in all respects in compliance with the provisions of the Constitution and general election laws of the State. PROPOSED AMENDMENTS To the Constitution of the State of Kansas, which were submitted at the Last Session of the Legislature, for Ratification or Rejection, by the Qualified Electors of the State, at the Next General Election. Concurrent Resolution Amending the Constitution of the State of Kansas. Be it resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring: SECTION 1. That there is hereby proposed for publication, and for submission to the qualified electors of the State of Kansas, at the next general election, for ratification or rejection, a proposition to amend section one, article five, of the Constitution, and wherever else in said Constitution it occurs, by striking out the word "white."

SECTION 2. That the ballots used at said election shall be written or printed as follows: "For Constitutional amendment striking out the word 'white,'" or "Against Constitutional amendment striking out the word 'white,'" as the voter may prefer.

SECTION 3. That said election shall be conducted in all respects in accordance with existing laws, and if a majority of the qualified electors of the State at said election shall vote in favor of striking out said word "white," it shall form and constitute no part of the Constitution of the State of Kansas, and if a majority of said electors shall vote against the proposition to strike out said word "white," it shall be and remain a part of said Constitution.

Concurrent Resolution to Amend Section Two of Article Five, of the Constitution of the State of Kansas. Resolved by the Senate, the House of Representatives concurring therein: SECTION 1. That the following amendment of Section Two, Article Five, of the Constitution of the State of Kansas, is hereby proposed for publication, to be approved or rejected by the electors of the State of Kansas, in pursuance of Section One, Article Fourteen, of the Constitution, said Section Two of Article Five to be amended so as to read as follows: SECTION TWO. No person under guardianship, non compos mentis or insane, no person convicted of felony, unless restored to civil rights, no person who has been dishonorably discharged from the service of the United States, unless reinstated, no person guilty of defrauding the Government of the United States, or any of the States thereof, no person guilty of giving or receiving a bribe, or offering to give or receive a bribe, and no person who has ever voluntarily borne arms against the Government of the United States, or in any manner aided or abetted in the attempted overthrow of said Government, except all persons who have been honorably discharged from the military service of the United States, since the first day of April, A. D. 1861, provided that they have served one year or more therein, shall be qualified to vote or hold office in this State, until such disability shall be removed by a law passed by a vote of two-thirds of all the members of both branches of the Legislature.

SECTION 2. This proposed amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State, for their approval or rejection, at the first general election, on the first Monday of the month of November, A. D. 1867; said election shall be governed by and returns made in all respects in accordance with the general election laws of the State.

SECTION 3. The ballots used at said election shall be written or printed as follows: "For amendment of Section Two, Article Five, restricting the elective franchise to loyal persons," or "Against amendment of Section Two, Article Five, restricting the elective franchise to loyal persons."
