HORRID AFFAIR.—A telegraphic despatch to the Louisville Journal, dated Cincinnati, May 19th, says:

A southerner yesterday purchased a negro woman and child at Covington, and placed them in jail for safe keeping. Last night the woman cut her child's throat, the man performing the same diabolical act upon the woman, and then cut his own throat. The man was living to-day, but his recovery is doubtful. The woman and child both died of the wounds inflicted.

The receipts for wharfage at Cincinnati for the month ending 11th inst., as we learn by the Cincinnati Commercial, was \$1,198 95. The number of boats that arrived, mostly of small class, was 199. We calculate that when our wharf is finished, the receipts for wharfage will equal this. Why not?

THE PRESIDENCY—DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.

Recent accounts from Washington say, that the Democratic Convention will adopt the two-thirds rule; that the Buchanan delegates will be admitted; that the old hunkers will be pensioned off; that Cass will be defeated for the nomination, and that Polk will not be a candidate. The Cincinnati Chronicle says: "Most of these statements we believe to be true. If so, Cass, Buchanan, Dallas, Walker & Co. are all out of the question! The Convention must then either nominate Levi Woodbury, or some entirely new man. It is said that the latter course will be adopted, and that F. R. SHERK, of Pennsylvania, will be nominated. Mr. Shunk would, on the whole, have some strong recommendations. The greatest, probably is, that he is utterly unknown and unthought of, by the great body of voters. On the other hand, there is one thing very much against him. It is the fact, that a trick of the same kind very rarely succeeds twice in succession. The people are on the look out for the trick of nominating an unknown again; and it is very likely will not approve the idea of going through another Polk Administration.

The nomination, too, will most thoroughly condemn the present administration, by discarding not only the President, but all his Cabinet from the field of debate!
