GEN. CASS AND THE WILMOT PROVISION.—The Washington Union, of the 1st inst., says that Gen. Cass maintains and will maintain his position on the slavery question at the risk of losing his own State.

So Gen. Cass, according to the Union, has at last come out boldly and unequivocally on the slavery question. He will veto the Wilmot proviso, says the Union. Remember this!

We observe that Robinson, Pettit, Cathcart, and Rockhill, Locofoco members of Congress from this State, voted in favor of the territorial compromise bill. Did they expect by voting thus to exclude slavery from the acquired territory? Or did they expect to make capital for Cass in the South?

ROUGH AND READY RALLY. Pursuant to a public call a very large and enthusiastic meeting of the friends of GEN. ZACHARY TAYLOR was held at the Court House in this city on Tuesday the 8th inst., for the purpose of forming themselves into a Rough and Ready Club.

The meeting was called to order by Mr. Lewis Howes, and Mr. R. Gill Harvey was appointed secretary, whereupon James E. Blythe, Esq., rose and moved that the meeting resolve itself into a Rough and Ready Club to be known as the "Vanderburgh County Rough and Ready Club," which motion was passed unanimously, and the following was then submitted as the Constitution for the government of the same:

Constitution of the Vanderburgh County Rough and Ready Club.

ART. I.—Sec. 1. Whereas, as Whigs and American citizens, we consider the ascendancy of Whig principles essential to the best interests of our common country; and believing the course of the present administration now, and for a long series of years past, to be destructive of those interests, and subversive of the fundamental principles of the constitution; and whereas, we as Whigs have the utmost confidence in the ability, integrity, and patriotism of Gen. Z. Taylor, and recognize in him a strong resemblance to the father of our country, and our earlier Presidents; and believing that if elected President of these United States, he will restore the government to its pristine purity; Therefore, we whose names are hereto subscribed, do pledge ourselves, each to the other, to use all honorable and fair means to secure his elevation to the highest office in the gift of a free people.

Sec. 2. This association shall be called the Vanderburgh County Rough and Ready Club, and shall hold its meetings at such times and places as a majority of the members shall designate.

Sec. 3. The officers of this association shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary and a Treasurer, who shall hold their office until the close of the present Presidential campaign.

The vote was taken on the adoption of the foregoing constitution and carried unanimously.

A committee consisting of T. E. Garven, J. A. Crane, A. Gumberts, J. J. Chandler and Jas. E. Blythe, was appointed to report permanent officers of the club, and having retired for a few moments returned and reported the following gentlemen to the meeting as the permanent officers of the Club.

Lewis Howes, President, James M. Parvin, Vice President, R. Gill Harvey, Secretary, Phillip Decker, Treasurer, who were unanimously elected.

James E. Blythe, Esq., was then called to the stand, and for nearly an hour succeeded in enchainning the attention of the meeting by an eloquent and impassioned speech, during the delivery of which he was repeatedly interrupted by the cheers and applause of the audience. He closed by announcing himself 'ready' at all times and in all places to respond to the calls of this, or any, or all other clubs. John J. Chandler, Esq., was then called to the stand, and for an hour succeeded in entertaining the audience who evinced their gratification by repeated and continued cheers. He, too, announced himself a working Whig until the 7th of November, 'ready' and more than willing to go wherever called in the cause of the People's candidate.

On motion Wednesday night of each week was named and adopted as the regular meeting nights of the Club, and Wednesday the 16th inst. was appointed for the first regular meeting.

On motion the thanks of the Club were unanimously tendered the Evansville Brass Band No. 1, for their attendance on the occasion, and they were invited to be present at each future meeting of the Club.

On motion the Editor of the Evansville Journal was authorized and requested to invite through his columns the members of the democratic and all other parties to meet with us on all occasions.

On motion the Club adjourned. LEWIS HOWES, Pres't. R. GILL HARVEY, Sect.

Indiana Elections.

The following are the returns from this state so far as heard from.

The Whigs have a majority in Jefferson county, of 541.

The Whig ticket is elected—a Whig gain of 400.

The Whigs have carried Jennings county by 300.

The returns thus far from Bartholomey county are favorable to the Whigs. They have gained one Senator in this county.

In Wayne county the Whig Legislative ticket has been elected.

Fayette county, Hawkins, W., elected. Marion county, 1 Whig and 3 locofocos elected.

The counties of Union, Jennings, Hendricks, Morgan, Vigo and Putnam have gone for the Whigs.

In Tippecanoe counties 2 Locos, Barnburners, have received a very heavy vote.

In Henry county the Locos elected their Senator. The Whig Legislative ticket has carried.

The counties of Montgomery, Randolph and Hancock are carried by the Locos.

Floyd county has gone for the Democrats by a majority of about 120.

Clark county gives about 200 majority for the Democratic ticket—about as she usually goes.

CONG. NED BAKER, Whig, has been elected to Congress from the Galena District, Illinois, vice Turner, Locofoco. A Whig gain.

We learn from the Louisville Courier of yesterday that CRITTENDEN is not only gaining everywhere, but is gaining largely. Counties which have heretofore been strongly Locofoco, such as Monroe and Larnie, now are rolling up fine majorities for Crittenden.—Crittenden's majority in Kentucky will certainly exceed 10,000.


