NOTICE. At a meeting of the Common Council, of the city of Evansville, October 21st, 1848, the following order was passed, to wit:

It is ordered that the owners of lots fronting on Water and Locust Streets, between Water and Second Streets, and the owners of lots fronting on Main street between Water and First Streets, be required, previous to the first day of December next, to cover said Streets, between said points, with gravel six inches deep, and to lay stone gutters on each side of said streets, four feet wide, with three rows of bricks set edge or end wise in the bottom of said gutters. The paving stones of said gutters to be 8 inches deep, the curb next the pavement 15 inches deep, and the outside curb 12 inches deep; the gutter to be nine inches deep, and the bricks placed next the curbing of the side walk. And also, that said owners of lots lay side walks on each side of Main street, from Water up to First street, twelve feet wide, and on Locust, from Water up to Second street, ten feet wide, and on Walnut, from Water up to Second street, 8 feet wide, and that said side walks be laid down by the first day of April next; and it is further ordered that the owners of lots fronting on Water street, between Walnut and Main streets, previous to the first day of December next, lay side walks between said points twelve feet wide, and gutters three feet wide of stone and brick, in the same manner and of similar materials as those previously mentioned. The whole of said work to be done under the direction of the Mayor and City Surveyor. Notice is therefore given that unless the owners of said lots comply with said order within the time therein appointed, the Common Council will proceed to have said work done, in accordance with the Ordinance in that case made and provided. An Ordinance regulating the mode of making improvements and repairs upon the Streets and Alleys of the city of Evansville. Passed October 21st, 1848. SEC. 1. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the city of Evansville, that whenever the Council shall order any improvements or repairs, to be made in or upon any street or alley, or part of any street or alley in the city, by grading, paving, graveling, curbing, or in any other way, the costs and expenses of such improvements or repairs, shall be charged against the lots on each side of such street or alley, equally per front foot. SEC. 2. Whenever the Council shall order any such improvements or repairs, notice of such order shall be given at least thirty days before the time of making such improvements or repairs, in some newspaper, printed in the city, requiring the owners of lots and parts of lots, fronting on such street or alley or part of such street or alley, to proceed to make such improvements or repairs; and if the owner or owners of the lots and parts of lots, mentioned in said notice, on any of them, shall not proceed to make such improvements or repairs within the time appointed by the Council; then the Council shall procure the same to be made, and such lots and parts of lots shall be liable for the expenses thereof as provided for in the first section of this ordinance. SEC. 3. On the completion of any such improvements or repairs, under the order and direction of the Council, in the manner above provided for, a precept, signed by the Mayor, attested by the Clerk, and under the seal of the city, shall be issued and delivered to the collector, commanding him that in the default of the payment of the sum chargeable against any such lot, or part of lot by the owner or owners thereof, he advertise and sell a lot or part of lot, or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay said expenses, chargeable thereon, together with the costs of such sale, which precept shall be returnable in forty days from the date thereof. SEC. 4. Such other and further proceedings, shall be had for the collection of the expenses aforesaid, as are provided for by the Ordinance concerning side walks. Passed April 20th, 1847.
