ELECTION OF GOVERNOR OF VIRGINIA.—The Legislature of Virginia, on Tuesday last, proceeded to the election of Governor of the State, and the following is the joint vote on each of the three ballots:

On the third ballot the whole number of votes cast was 161—necessary to a choice 81—and J. B. Floyd having received 96 votes, was declared duly elected Governor of Virginia for three years from January 1st, 1849.

The Louisville Courier says: A passenger on the steamer Martha Washington was robbed of the sum of \$140 by another passenger on the boat. They were from New Orleans and the robbery was committed at the mouth of the canal. The fellow that stole the money was suspected and closely watched. He took a hack to come up in town and was ready to start when he was seized and examined and the money found on his person.

FRANCE AND THE LIBERIAN REPUBLIC.—The N. Y. Journal of Commerce says that authentic information has been received at Washington, through letters from Gov. Roberts, of Liberia, that the French Government has not only recognized the Republic of Liberia, but also placed at its disposal three armed vessels to be used in the suppression of the slave trade, and in the protection of the interests of the republic.

CAPTURE OF A SLAVER WITH OVER FOUR HUNDRED SLAVES.—Capt. Kennard, of ship Goodwin, which arrived at Boston on Monday week, from Calcutta, touched at St. Helena, October 12, and states that a brig, with upwards of four hundred slaves, arrived at St. Helena a few days previous.

She was captured by H. B. M. ship Britomart, on the West coast of Africa, without colors or papers. She had been boarded several times by H. B. M. brig Dart, when she always represented herself as the American brig Fredrica, with American colors and papers. She was taken at Congo, at which place it appears, she was delivered to Brazilian purchasers, and thence to St. Helena, for adjudication at the Vice Admiralty Court.—About forty of the negroes were lost on the passage. The remainder were put into the depot, and when fit to go, would, with their own free will and consent, be sent to one of the West India Islands.

THE MURDER TRIAL AT WORCESTER.—A correspondent of the Boston Times says that when the verdict was declared, the prisoner, Cook, occupied a box, the sides of which were about four feet high; and when the Court passed the order for his discharge, he did not wait for the door of his box to be opened, but leaped over the top, and sprang toward the outer door of the room, exhibiting the most extravagant tokens of joy at his deliverance. He has been one year in prison.
