SWEDEN.—The following is an extract from a communication, received at the Department of State, dated Stockholm, February 17, 1846.
"IT is now feared that the hoped-for exemption of Sweden from the famine that is scouring northern Europe will not be realized. Around Stockholm, indeed, and in southern Sweden, there is at present no great scarcity of provisions; but during the past two weeks sad accounts have reached the government of great distress in the northern provinces. This will occasion, however, no abatement of the tariff upon foreign grain. It is probable, however, in consequence of the high price of flour that a few cargoes of American breadstuffs would yield good returns."
