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President's Message upon the Territorial Question.

The following message from President Taylor is in response to certain resolutions for information concerning the Territory of California, its Government, &c. It is an amplification of the recommendations in the annual message, in relation to our newly acquired possessions, suggesting a distinct and specific method of adjusting the difficult questions therewith connected.

WASHINGTON, J. 24, 1850. To the House of Representatives of the United States: I transmit to the House of Representatives, in answer to a resolution of that body, passed on the 31st of December last, the accompanying report of heads of departments, which contain all the official information on the possession of the Executive and of the Territory.
