ROSVILLE, May 15.—Last Saturday, Rev. Francis S. Potts, accompanied by Rev. Charles W. Tinsley, presiding elder of the Southeast Indiana Conference, started from Milroy to Mt. Olivette, a few miles distant, where quarterly meeting was to take place.

JEFFERSONVILLE, May 15.—James Conroy is dead, and he carried with him to the grave the mystery of his death. He died this morning shortly after 3 o'clock at the residence of Wm. Jackson, where he had been conveyed by the city marshal last evening.
