

FATAL EXPLOSION.

A Workman's Carelessness Causes the Death of Four Men and the Injury of Others.

MONTREAL, May 26.—The new gasometer at the gas-works at Hochelaga exploded between 8 and 8:30 this morning, and was attended with considerable loss of life. Up to 10:30 o'clock seven dead bodies had been taken from the ruins. Most of the bodies taken out were only slightly bruised, and it is supposed death was caused from suffocation. One poor fellow had his chest completely crushed in. It is stated that the building was undergoing repairs. The men who were painting on the roof were blown fifty feet in the air, but escaped serious injury. It is supposed that as many as thirty were more or less injured. The building itself is a total wreck, and nothing but the iron pillars remain standing. Bricks were blown fifty to one hundred feet on all sides. Some sheds and outbuildings of the Montreal street railway, which are in close proximity to the reactor, were somewhat damaged, but with this exception the buildings in the immediate vicinity have not suffered, except through the breaking of windows. A large gang of men are hard at work excavating for the body of a man who, it is supposed, was in the interior of the building when the explosion took place. It is said that the explosion was caused by leaking gas becoming ignited by a lantern which one of the men foolishly carried into the building. The official report that several bodies have been taken from the ruins is incorrect. Four persons in all lost their lives. These names were: Joseph Angel, John Angel, Samuel McPhee and Samuel Bell. It is now officially stated that six persons were injured, three of whom will die. The officials say that it is impossible to give the loss at present.

The Scott-Wagner Case.

GREENSBORO, Ind., May 26.—The jury in the Scott vs. Wagner case this morning returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiff, finding that she is the owner of thirteen-eighths of the fine residence property in Shelbyville, valued at \$11,500, which gives her \$3,305.44. This is the case where the daughter sued her father and alleged cruel and inhuman treatment of her in order to conceal her right to a part of the property in question. This verdict upholds the theory that the people of Shelbyville were justified in their conduct when they drove Wagner from his home and rescued the daughter from a cruel confinement in the cellar and garret.

Natural Gas at Tripton.

TRADE WAR AGAINST RUSSIA

Bismarck Engaged in Devising a Scheme of Retaliatory Customs Measures.

Which Will Be Directed Against Merchants of the Czar's Dominions, with a View to Showing Them the Error of Their Ways.

The German Passport Decree Causes Much Grumbling and Is Not Popular.

Emperor Frederick's Disease Continues to Make Steady Progress and the Passage to the Lunga Slowly Becomes Smaller.

GERMANY WILL RETALIATE.

Bismarck Trying to Adjust German Tariffs in a Manner That Will Injure Russia.

BERLIN, May 26.—The inauguration of retaliatory customs measures against Russia is delayed until Austria is prepared to join in the economic war. Public feeling in Germany and the opinion of business men concur in approving the government's projected reprisals. It is not necessary for Prince Bismarck to await the assent of the Reichstag before decreeing a prohibitory tariff. Under the law of 1879 the government is empowered to raise the tariff 50 per cent. for countries treating Germany unfavorably. The assent of the Reichstag must be asked afterward. Nobody can contest the fact that Russia is placing an exceptional tariff on German products. For instance, coal and coke entering Russian ports on the Baltic pay 14 copeck duty, against 14 copecks crossing the German frontier. The tax most unfavorable to German industry is the differential duty on pig-iron, which amounts to 17 per cent. levied across the frontier. The impending fiscal projects of the Czar's government will also raise the duties on cotton fabrics and German wines. Sometimes the St. Petersburg authorities influence the railways to divert exports to Baltic ports, instead of over German railroads, by giving preference rates to Riga, Revel and Libau. The railway directors, under the inspiration of the government, propose to break the convention of rates formed last year with the German railways, by which the advantages secured by Memel, Konigsberg and Danzig have given an impetus to the trade of those ports. Further orders to the Governor of the Baltic provinces direct him to energetically pursue the policy of expelling the German traders and farmers. Letters from Konigsberg describe numerous arrivals of families of traders, who were expelled during the present week on the briefest notice. They had been refused permission to become naturalized. Their property was seized, and they were sent to Germany absolutely ruined.

GENERAL FOREIGN NEWS.

Herr Richter Improves an Opportunity to Attack the German Official Organ.

BERLIN, May 26.—Both the houses of the Landtag met at 6 o'clock this evening in joint session, Herr Richter presiding. Herr Von Puttkamer read the royal order closing the session. Previous to the final session the lower house held a sitting, when Herr Richter, seizing a change during discussion of the validity of an election, attacked the Conservative national press as licensed organs that were privileged during the recent Chancellor crisis to defend Prince Bismarck at the expense of Empress Victoria. He specially alluded to the petitions to the crown which have been set forth in Leipzig and Breslau, asking the retention of Prince Bismarck in office, and condemned vehemently the action of the government in interrupting proceedings against the Progressist papers for reprinting from Conservative journals personal attacks upon the Emperor, while allowing the original source of the attacks to go unmolested.

Herr Richter's speech evoked rejoinders from Herr Richter, Herr Richter, and Eydien, National Liberals, each of whom protested against Herr Richter's dragging the name of the sovereign into the debate.

GAS AT JEFFERSONVILLE.

Residents of the City Excited Over the Opening of What Promises to Be a "Gusher."

JEFFERSONVILLE, Ind., May 26.—The natural gas company of this place has struck a "gusher," and Jeffersonville is much excited. Some three months ago gas was found at Beach's woods, one mile from the city, and the flow was estimated at half a million cubic feet per day. On account of a misunderstanding with Judge Ferguson, the owner of the grounds, they were never leased, and the gas was not utilized. The company abandoned the site and have since bored to Trenton rock in several other places, but without success. Their last well was located on the Roswell farm, three miles from the city, and it was the intention of the company, if no gas was found, to sink no more wells. Contractor Dean moved his derrick to the place about a week ago, and the drill was put in motion. The iron shaft passing through a strata of shale, yesterday, at a depth of 250 feet, when an odor of natural gas caused the workmen to cease operations for a few moments. The machinery was set in motion again and the escaping of the pent-up fluid increased in volume until operations were a second time suspended. The flow increased until the volume was estimated at 2,000,000 cubic feet per day. To-day the work of boring was continued and another "gusher" was struck at a depth of 280 feet. The fluid comes up the aperture with a great roaring, hissing noise that can be heard a distance of more than a mile. Small stones and silver and gold coins dropped into the aperture are forced out by the escaping gas and carried to the top of the derrick. Professor Goodwin, one of the stockholders of the company, dropped \$200 worth of coins and was surprised to see the coin shoot into the air twenty feet. Capitalists in the vicinity are flocking to the place, and all the land in the vicinity is being leased. The American Plate-glass Company, of New Albany, one of the largest firms of the kind in the country, has leased an entire farm near the well. The output is estimated at 5,000,000 cubic feet per day. Boring has been suspended at the well.

BOSTON CORBETT AT LARGE.

The Insane Slay of Wilkes Booth Escapes from the Custody of His Keepers.

TORONTO, Kan., May 26.—An sensation was caused to-day by the escape from the State Insane Asylum of Boston Corbett, who killed Wilkes Booth, the assassin of President Lincoln. While out for regular morning exercise with other patients, Corbett suddenly broke from the tracks, jumped on a horse belonging to a visitor, and was away before the guard could realize what had happened. Corbett has been confined in the asylum for the past month, and during that time had been more or less violent. Corbett has several times threatened to escape and kill the Governor and other State officials. While anything to do with his incarceration. It is believed that he has gone to his home in Cloud county. Corbett caused a great sensation in the State when, as a look-alike, he appeared before the House of Representatives and caused the House to adjourn by flourishing two pistols and threatening to kill the Speaker and other members.

Restrictions on Travel.

The German Decree Does Not Meet Approval, and Modification Will Be Sought.

BERLIN, May 26.—Prince Bismarck is expected in Berlin to-morrow. His return is accelerated by the state of the negotiations with Austria on the Russian tariff question and the attitude of the French government toward the Alsace-Lorraine question. M. Herbetot, the French ambassador, has asked for an interview with the Chancellor, and it is surmised, with the intention of urging the withdrawal or modification of the decree. Prince Hohenlohe was summoned from Strasbourg to report upon the situation in Alsace-Lorraine. He was reported by the Emperor yesterday and will meet Prince Bismarck on Monday. The passport decree does not meet with solid approval.
