THE HON. HANNIBAL HAMLIN. Still Gentle and Hearty Among His Friends in Old Maine.

The veteran Hannibal Hamlin, the greater part of whose life has been spent in politics, is the most interesting character that meets one on the streets of Bangor.

John Grelow was, yesterday, cleaning out a furnace in the gas-room at the malleable iron-works at Black Rock, N. Y., when he fell into it and was suffocated and burned to death.

John Korn, of New York, made himself doubtly sure when he committed suicide. He went out on the East river in a skiff, stabbed himself with a pen-knife several times, un-encumbered, jumped into the river.

In 1856, when he had been announced as the Memorial-day orator at Bangor, he was much concerned lest the government would be asked to under-stand that he was to make a set speech.

Perhaps those good men are looking down upon us at this moment. I think I see them now as they tread their silent beats in their eternal coming ground, and I catch a voice, gentle but stern to my ear, that demands of me and demands of you that you cherish their memory that you deal by their heroic acts as they, God changing our condition, would have dealt by us.

Not to mention numerous dinners and club meetings, Mr. Hamlin has since then attended the national encampment at St. Louis and the State encampments in Maine. At Ellsworth on May 30, he declared that he had then made his last speech in public, that it was time he had said farewell, but there are political reasons ahead, and without doubt the retired statesman will again make himself heard.

One of Mr. Hamlin's sons, Gen. Charles Hamlin, has been elected to the Maine House of Representatives and very nearly a candidate for Governor on the Republican ticket, but he had to be sacrificed for Mr. Blaine's man, the late J. R. Bodwell. The other sons have been less prominent in public life.

McGlynn's Direful Prediction. New York, July 8.—In the course of his weekly address before the Anti-Poverty Society to-night, Dr. McGlynn said: "Some day there will be a tremendous revolution, which will sweep the French uprising, in which the people will rise up in their wrath at the interference of their dictators, and bayonet, and club these monks, and priests, and archbishops, the pope, and cardinals. This is the way the Lord will deal with them; so I may leave them to His mercy." This was fittingly cheered.

Smith's Folly Mistake. LACONA, N. H., July 8.—Geo. M. Smith helped himself to what he supposed was bread at Odell's drug store, in Lake Village, to-day. Ten minutes later he dropped dead. He had eaten bromide, paralyzing the heart and nerves. The clerk of the store, who is a relative of Smith's, will have to explain why he dispensed liquor without a prescription, and why he allowed Smith to help himself instead of waiting on him.

THE WHEN

THE ALLEGED CONSPIRACY. Rumors that Confessions Have Been Made, but the Stories Are Not Ready for Publication.

CHICAGO, July 8.—The question whether Smith, Bowles or any other of those arrested as suspects in the alleged dynamite conspiracy have made confessions, is still a mooted one. Affirmative inferences can only be taken from conversations with those directly interested in the management of the case for the "Q" road, William A. Pinkerton closes his eyes and refuses to affirm or deny, and adds that General-manager Stone has been agreed upon as the spokesman, and that all news must come from him.

General Manager Stone was seen to-night, and he expressed himself strongly pleased with the condition of affairs. He said the road is bound to make out a case against those already implicated, and perhaps against others not yet arrested, but who are under the strictest surveillance. He has no objection to what was a great conspiracy, he says, has had its backbone broken and the loss of life and property has been averted.

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THE VIRGINIA REPUBLICANS

Mahone and Riddleberger Bury the Ax and Will Labor for Party Success.

Personal Quarrels Set Aside, and the Republican Leaders Will Make a Determined Effort to Carry the State for Harrison.

Good Effect of the Republican Leaven That Is at Work in West Virginia.

Facts About Australian Wool That Ought to Make Votes Against the Mills Bill—Mr. Higgins Again Seeks Political Office.

VIRGINIA REPUBLICANS.

The Leaders Bury Their Differences and Will Work for Party Success. Special to the Indianapolis Journal.

WASHINGTON, July 8.—In all calculations upon the outcome of the present campaign it has been usual to concede the electoral votes of the entire Southern States to the Democratic ticket. There has been, at times during the past four years, more or less talk of carrying Virginia and North Carolina on the same name, but within the past few months the open hostilities between Senator Mahone on the one hand and ex-Congressman Wise and Senator Riddleberger on the other, have been regarded as certain indications of the defeat of the Republican party in the Old Dominion.

There is no doubt a decided disposition in Virginia toward shaking loose from the Democratic ticket and the Democratic platform, and if harmony could be perfected in the Republican ranks the prospects of Republican success in that State would be enhanced a hundred fold. Now it is said this desired harmonious arrangement has been effected, and that hereafter the three principal leaders in the Republican party of Virginia will work together for the common good. Senator Riddleberger, being interviewed upon this subject, thus states the manner in which unity between himself and ex-Senator Mahone was brought about: "At the urgent solicitation of some of the most prominent of the Republican national leaders I made a proposition to ex-Senator Mahone to meet me with a view to the adjustment of our difficulties. He came to see me at Chicago, where I was acting with what was miscalled the Wise faction, but the time was not opportune and the interview was postponed until we reached Washington, when he came to see me at my rooms. We had a long and earnest talk, and have met twice since. The result of those conferences is that we can now work together for the good of the Republican party. We both recognized that great interest was paramount, and that our personal differences were insignificant beside it. The same flag of truce will be extended in other directions until the Republican party of Virginia is again a harmonious whole."

"Are Mr. Wise and Mahone also friends?" "Not yet; but their differences are beyond the political line. They are personal, and must and should be swept aside. The situation at Chicago was this: We got fourteen delegates and Mahone got ten, but the convention recognized the formality of his State convention, which left him practically master of the situation. At Chicago the Wise faction proposed to put me on as national committeeman, and took that action, but when it learned that Mahone was willing, we then whipsawed right around and voted for ex-Congressman Brady, whom they knew Mahone never would support. Ex-Governor Lee and one other delegate, however, refused to support this action. All this was a direct blow at harmony and reconciliation. I speak with perfect confidence when I say that Senator Mahone has been and is willing to go as far toward reconciliation as anyone has a right to expect, but Brady he will never recognize. The result will be that Brady will be ignored in the management of the State campaign. When the district conventions meet they will nominate candidates for Congress and electors, and probably will pass resolutions expressing a lack of confidence in Mr. Brady. Whether or not this will have the desired effect is an open question. It is my honest opinion that we have a good fighting chance to carry Virginia for the Republican party, and that it is the only State in the South where that ticket stands a ghost of a chance."

Senator Riddleberger, in speaking of the Pittsburg interview, said he was deeply in his berth until Baltimore was nearly reached and the alleged conversation was wholly manufactured. He added that Mr. Mahone saw no interviewer at Pittsburg, and Wise was also asleep.

REPUBLICAN LEAVEN.

How It is Working Among the Young Democrats of West Virginia. Special to the Indianapolis Journal.

WASHINGTON, July 8.—As an evidence of the political feeling of the young men in Virginia, I give the following conversation with a gentleman who has been between church and chapel for half a century by the veil of secrecy. Not long ago, Mrs. Francis W. Meeks, of Walnut Hills, died, aged seventy-two, and left \$40,000. She had been a member of the church for many years, and several personal heirs whom she named. One George Spencer Baker, a farmer, living twelve miles south of Covington, Ky., was the youngest child of whom his parents had been a life-long mystery, appeared as a contestant of the will, on the ground that Mrs. Meeks was his mother. Rather than let the matter go into court, the other heirs, none of them her children, as she left no acknowledged issue, agreed to a settlement which gives Baker \$14,000. It appears that Baker was a young man when Miss Francis Meeks, who was twenty years old, was divorced from her last husband. The strange secret was revealed to Baker a few years ago by a man known to him.

Independent Order B'nai B'rith. CLEVELAND, O., July 8.—Prominent Jews from all parts of the country are in attendance at the annual meeting of the Independent Order of B'nai B'rith, which will conclude with the dedication of the new Jewish orphan asylum. At the annual meeting of the board of trustees, to-day, it was reported that the new building would cost \$194,000. Samuel Ab, of Cincinnati, was elected trustee in place of his brother, Dr. Joseph Ab, deceased. Thirty-nine new graduates and sixty-one applicants were granted admission. A banquet was tendered the visitors at the Excelsior club house. The receipts for the year were \$34,000 and the expenditures about the same.

Two Children Drowned. LACONA, N. H., July 8.—While a party of two ladies and four children were crossing a bridge over their's to Governor's Island, near Winnipisogee, to-day, the horse became frightened, and backed the carriage into the lake. Two children, Carrie and Arthur Brocklebank, of Boston, were drowned. Mrs. J. F. Sedley, of New York, was badly injured by a kick from the horse. The others were rescued with difficulty.

AUSTRALIAN WOOL.

A Compilation of Figures That Makes an Argument Against the Mills Bill. Special to the Indianapolis Journal.

WASHINGTON, July 8.—The last special or bulletin edition of the United States Consular Reports, issued at the Department of State this week, contains a lengthy and carefully-prepared statement on the subject of Australian wool from United States Consul Griffin, at Sydney, New South Wales. It is stated upon the authority of a Democratic member of the House that this report was prepared for the purpose of making an impression upon Congress in the discussion of the Mills tariff bill, but the figures produced by it form an argument against the adoption of the free-wool clause in the tariff bill. There are two sets of tabular statements in this report. One of them contains the value of the wool produced in Australia from 1872 to 1888, while the other gives an exhibit showing the exports of wool to the United States from Melbourne for each season since 1871. To appreciate the meaning of these figures it must be stated, upon the authority of Democratic members of the House committee on ways and means, that Australian wool is worth about 33 per cent in excess of the wool of the United States. One of the arguments offered by the Democrats in favor of free wool is that the Australian wool is finer than the United States wool, and that it is necessary in the manufacture of goods from the product of the United States. This report shows that the average product of wool in Australia during the last year was 100,000,000 lbs., valued at \$10,000,000. Each bale averaged a little over \$38 in American money, and during the last year one firm exported from the single port of Melbourne 19,909 bales of wool to the United States.

It is shown further in this report that the total number of sheep in the United States during the period embraced has increased from 19,000,000 to 20,000,000. The increase in the Australian export of wool to the United States during the same period has doubled, thus showing that our imports of wool is increased rapidly in proportion to the increase in the number of sheep, notwithstanding the duty now levied on foreign wool. This is a clear demonstration, proven by Democratic figures, that the wool of the United States is not so good as the wool of Australia, and that the wool of the United States is growing more rapidly than the products.

Farmers will read with interest a comparison between the wool of Australia and that of the United States. While the ordinary unwashed wool was commanding 22 cents this spring in our markets, the Australian wool, quoted as "good average" at 18 or 19 cents, was quoted in the American markets at 30 cents a pound. To appreciate keenly the comparison of these figures the reader should add about 33 per cent to the figure on the Australian wool, and he would recognize the arguments the Democrats are making now in the House. It can readily be seen how much cheaper than American wool the wool of Australia is, and how much more valuable it is in American markets if wool is placed on the free list by the passage of the Mills bill.

He Agains Seeks Political Notoriety, but Finds Himself Without Influence. WASHINGTON, July 8.—Eugene Higgins, the Baltimore ward striker, who achieved so much notoriety in a short time as appointment clerk of the Treasury Department, and who gave out to the press that he was tired of public life and desired to enter into private business, has been appointed a special agent of the Treasury Department. Higgins is reported to be a member of a class of cheap politicians who were brought into prominence by his administration, and, proving unsatisfactory, were thrown overboard after a brief trial, and permitted to sink out of sight. A year ago the name of Higgins appeared in almost every newspaper in the country, daily, and the name of Higgins was a household word. It is thought that he was for all time to come an influential citizen of the United States. Immediately after he retired from his office he returned to his political haunts around Baltimore and the capital of Maryland, and began to engage in the species of small politics which has given him a political hold upon the masses of his native State. It is said that Higgins is desirous of securing another place under the administration, and that he has been soliciting his friends in Congress to help him to secure a position. It is reported that he has left Higgins to "sink or swim" some time before the latter left the Treasury Department, and he himself without any of that political influence he himself has had in the past.
