THE FIFTIETH CONGRESS.

Interesting Discussion of the Treaty-Making Power—The Chinese Question. WASHINGTON, July 20.—The House bill appropriating \$50,000 for a public building at Brownsville, Tex., was passed.

The Senate, at 12:25, proceeded to executive business. After the doors were opened, Mr. Sherman gave notice that he would ask the Senate to resume consideration of the fisheries treaty tomorrow.

Mr. Chandler thereupon offered the following resolution, which was laid over: Resolved, That the power to make treaties and to appoint all high public officers of the United States being vested in the President and Senate jointly,

and sign the proposed treaty with Great Britain, dated Feb. 15, 1888, and unwaranteed by the Senate. A bill was reported and placed on the calendar for the creation of a public building at Chicago.

Mr. Delph called up the bill to prohibit the coming of Chinese laborers into the United States. Mr. Delph said this bill was intended to carry into effect the provisions of the pending treaty and prevent the abuse of the privileges granted to one class of Chinese, to pass through the United States and to prevent the evasion of the treaty by a class of Chinese not permitted to come into the country.

Mr. Morgan could not understand why the gentleman would vote for a bill to carry into effect a treaty which he said was a sham and a fraud. If he [Mr. Morgan] believed that a treaty was a sham and a fraud, he would never give a vote to carry it into effect.

Mr. Mitchell suggested that then the Senator would admit that the effect of the first amendment would be to exclude this country at least 50,000 Chinese who would be permitted to come under the treaty as sent here by the President.

Mr. Morgan replied that he thought the treaty was originally sent to the Senate excluded these Chinese, but that there had been some difference between grammarians about the meaning of the word "admitted" in the treaty.

Mr. Spinoza grows warm. WASHINGTON, July 20.—The first business before the House this morning was the bill coming over from last night's session, appropriating \$250,000 to aid State homes for disabled volunteers.

Mr. Kilgore, of Texas, moved to amend by reducing the appropriation to \$100,000. It was the duty of the municipal subdivisions of the government, he said, to care for their own paupers.

Mr. Kilgore said the gentleman had put words into his mouth that he had never used. It seemed to be the policy of the Republican party to enlarge the powers of the federal government and contract the powers of the State governments, and this measure was in the line of this policy.

Mr. Townsend favored the bill, and said it had been the policy of the Democratic party to provide liberally for every disabled soldier of the Republic, no matter in what war he had been engaged.
