THE TWO-BALLOT FRAUD

The Leaders and Managers of the Democratic Party Confess that That Is Their Plan for Stealing Indiana.

DOUBLE-BALLOT FRAUD. The Journal has information coming directly from the inside of the Democratic committee-rooms that the double ballot is their principal reliance...

The plan is to have these double ballots voted to the extent of five or ten in each precinct where the inspector is a Democrat, who can be used by the criminals managing it to do his part in the fraud.

Yesterday we learned from a man who had been taken into the scheme by the Democrats that double voting was to be resorted to by them all over the State.

The information discloses the name of the man giving the instruction, but we are not yet ready to make it known to the public.

Acting upon the information thus obtained, and hoping to circumvent it, Mr. Huston yesterday addressed the following letter to Hon. Charles L. Jewett, chairman of the Democratic State committee:

Dear Sir—In order to prevent the possibility of the casting or counting of two or more ballots by one voter, the Republican State central committee of Indiana...

Accepting Mr. Jewett's suggestion, Mr. Huston had drawn up the following agreement: It is agreed between the Democratic and Republican State central committees of Indiana...

Each voter and election inspector in this State is hereby earnestly requested to carry out this agreement in good faith.

It is also agreed that the bands for this purpose shall be furnished to the several county chairmen by the State central committee above named...

Dear Sir—I return herewith, unopened, the agreement submitted to me by you in regard to the putting of rubber bands upon the ballots to be voted next Tuesday.

Mr. Huston responded with a letter, in which he made the proposed amendment, including also the statement that Mr. Burford, the Democratic State printer, had agreed to furnish the necessary bands.
